TODAY the sure money is made in developing orchard lands. No one will for a moment deny that fact. The world's supply for the next twenty years, according to government statistics will be short. The northwest produces the only apples that set the standard of quality for the market. Therefore, not only the United States but the entire world is looking to the northwest for its supply of first class apples.

All this being true, let us call your attention to the difference in apple lands of the northwest. Men are growing wealthy from apple lands in Hood River, Wenatchee, Medford and Yakima, yet right here in the Grande Ronde valley, at our very door, is apple land that is proven to be a much better investment and will earn a great deal more money than land in the districts named.

For instance, in Hood River, Wenatchee, Medford and Yakima a six-year-old orchard brings \$2,000 per acre, and a ten to twenty year old orchard brings \$3,000. The actual cost of production, including spraying, pruning and EXTRA grading is 70 cents per box. The average sale price of these apples is \$2.50, netting the grower \$1.80 per box.

Here in the Imbler district six-year-old orchard land is priced at \$500 an acre and the 10 to 20 year old orchard is priced at \$800 an acre. On account of freedom from pests, climatic conditions and difference in grading it costs the producer but 40 cents a box to raise his apples. These find ready sale at \$1.25 per box, netting the grower 85 cents.

When you consider the difference in price of land in favor of the Imbler district, the low cost of production, no irrigation, and the final prices received for the product the Imbler land far exceeds the land in the above named districts when it comes to returning the dividends on labor and capital invested, and the dividend is always proof of the wise or unwise investment.

The people of Eastern Oregon should compare the money-earning features of every proposition before they invest their savings, and if this is done there will be no question but what they will seek investment in the Imbler district because it will prove to them what can be done before a dollar is parted with.

TARVIA PROCESS DISLIKED

LETTERS FROM TOWNS WHERE USED, BELITTLE IT.

First Opinion of Tarvia Process Offered by Letters From Cities

Letters from officials in Massachusetts, Toronto, Canada, Atlantic City and other places of scattered location, have been received by Chairman A. V. Andrews of the street committee and other city officials of La Grande, pointing out that tarvia pavement is not satisfactory. Considerable interest was originally attached to that particular kind of paving because it could be done for \$1.25 a square yard and pamphlets received here describing it, indicated the process was desirable. Taxpayers have shown much interest in the proposition and letters from points where tarvia has been used, have been read with interest by people living in streets where paving will be carried on.

A stack of letters dealing on the subject are now in the recorder's office. To date little encouragement has been received. Perhaps the coldest water thrown on tarvia by these letters comes from Cambridge, Mass., where a city official at that place writes:

I have been requested to give an opinion of tarvia and will state this material has been used here for laying dust on macadam streets and a new macadam pavement mixed with tarvia was laid on Massachusetts avenue in the summer of 1908. It is not a permanent pavement and that on Massachusetts avenue shows considerable wear and there are several places where it has worn through. This street is very muddy in wet weather and dusty in the summer except when sprinkled with oil, which forms a sticky paste that is tracked into the houses and stores.

On the whole I would not consider it a desirable pavement.
