## GOULD RETAINS BOX CAR CASES HIS HOLD GIVEN JURY

MISSOURI PACIFIC STILL UNDER HIS JURISDICTION.

General Break-Up of State Prepared Prior to the Election.

St. Louis, March 14.—Spectacular fights to wrest control of the Missouri Pacific from Gould ended today with the election of directors and Gould retains control, though four directors slated for election in February by Gould, Rockefeller, Kuhn and Loeb interests failed.

S. F. Pryor and S. C. Clark retain places although Gould announced they would be dropped. E. B. Pryor, vice president of the Wabash, succeeds J. J. Slocum who represented the Sage interests and R. Lancaster Williams, representing Gould, was elected.

The case to follow the box car case is the one wherein the state is prosecuting the man who entered the J. W. White grocery and was shot in the leg by the clerk sleeping at the store, and arrested forthwith by the clerk who marched the would-be thief to the city jail at the point of a gun.

## "THIS IS MY BIRTHDAY"

William English Walling.

William English Walling, the wealthy young Socialist, who recently figured conspicuously in the news as defendant in a \$100,000 breach of promise suit, was born in Louisville, Ky., March 14, 1877. He is a grandson of William H. English of Indiana, who was candidate for vice president of the United States on the democratic ticket in 1880. Mr. Walling inherited a large fortune from his grandfather. He received his early education in the public schools of Indianapolis and in Edinburgh, Scotland, where his father Canada and the United States. Several years. Returning to America he pursued his studies at the university of Chicago, where he took a post-graduate course in economics and sociology. In 1900 he was appointed a factory inspector in Illinois, which position he resigned a year later to engage in settlement work in New York. For the past ten years Mr. Walling has been a resident at the university settlement in the metropolis. In recent years he has become well known as a writer and lecturer on labor and sociological questions.
