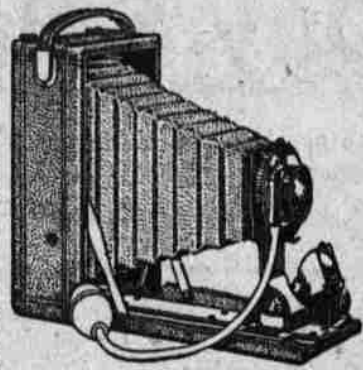

Petitioners Agree That Tarvia Is Not Suiited for the Purpose.

That bitulithic pavement, considering low prices offered, is far more satisfactory than Tarvia, first considered by property owners of Main avenue, was expressed last night before the council when the petition for the paving of Main avenue from First street to Fourth street was changed to read bitulithic. The resolution providing for this grade of pavement was passed last night.

The petitioners originally asked that the council investigate Tarvia pavement, but it has been found to be unsatisfactory and in view of the fact that the Warren people have decided to build the pavement for \$2.00 per square yard, the petitioners asked that bitulithic be used in the pavement.
