Viterbo, March 18.—Declaring they had been tortured by starvation and not allowed to sleep, two score Cammerists now on trial, appealed to the judge for protection. The judge said he believed the prisoners were lying but that he would investigate matters. The trial is involving about 40 members of the secret order and is the sensation of the nation.

Retirement of Gen. Ward.

Washington, March 18.—Brig. Gen. Frederick K. Ward, whose last command was that of the post at Fort Riley, Kas., will be retired from the army tomorrow on account of age. Gen. Ward is from Ohio and was graduated from West Point in 1870. Most of his service was in the cavalry arm. His retirement results in the promotion of Col. Sanderson, of the Ninth cavalry, to the rank of brigadier general.

Mrs. Schenk in Court Again.

Wheeling, W. Va., March 18.—Mrs. Laura Farnsworth Schenk whose trial on the charge of attempting to poison her husband, John O. Schenk, a wealthy packer, resulted in a disagreement of the jury last January, was arraigned before Judge Jordan today, to answer the indictment again. Since her first trial Mrs. Schenk has been at liberty.

Small Boy Christens Ship.

Detroit, Mich. March 18.—Disregarding the custom of having a young lady as sponsor, the Ashley and Dustin line selected Master William Heyser of Cincinnati to christen the new passenger steamer, "Put-in-Bay" which was launched today at the Wyandotte yards of the Detroit Shipbuilding company. The new steamer is to ply between Detroit, Sandusky and Put-in-Bay, beginning the coming summer.

Pacific Land and Products Show.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 18.—The management anticipates an attendance of 200,000 visitors at the Pacific Land and Products exposition, which opened in Los Angeles today and will continue until the end of March. The show is made up of a large variety of attractive exhibits illustrating the resources of all the vast territory west of the Rocky Mountains, including the western coast of Mexico.

Eugene, Ore., March 18.—A hundred lumbermen, members of the Oregon and Washington Lumber Manufacturers' association, met in Eugene today for the first of a series of monthly meetings to be held in various lumber centers of the northwest.
