BASEBALL BUG AT UNIVERSITY

LYNCH OF SYRACUSE IS COACH AT OREGON.

Squad of Forty Men Out for the Team Indicating Success.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oregon, March 20.—(Special)—Paul J. Lynch, a former Syracuse baseball star, arrived the early part of the week and began his duties as baseball coach at the university. The work of Mr. Lynch, who has an excellent reputation not only as a player, but also as a coach, caused considerable comment among those who are watching the development of the 1911 squad. Football training rules must be observed by all who are trying for the coveted positions—smoking, chafing dish parties with the coeds, late hours and all form of athletic dissipation is tabooed, the rigid rules taking effect from today on until the close of the season.

Prospects are excellent for a good aggregation at Oregon this year. Henkle, who played with the Seattle league last summer, is of course disqualified but is acting as assistant coach. The pitching staff will consist of Houch, a freshman twirler of much fame from Portland, and Harold Pete, an Eastern Oregon boy from Sumpter town, where they take to baseball as ducks take to water. Pete has made good from the start, and in all probability the big miner will be in the regular slab staff.

Cousin, a Portland sophomore, is also showing varsity form in the box and will likely be third man. Captain Taylor will be the mainstay behind the catcher's mask. Jamison on first and Chandler in left field are sure places, but the other positions are the cause of keen competition among the many new men and the other veterans. Among the most promising freshman material are Fenton, of Dallas, infielder, and Roberts, of Salem high, infielder. The squad during the last week has averaged 40 men.
