JUDGE LINDSEY HERE APRIL 4

FAMOUS JUDGE AND HIS COURT TO BE SEEN AND HEARD.

Lyceum Bureau to Bring Lindsey to La Grande Early in April.

One is instinctively inclined to discredit or at any rate to discount much that is written nowadays on political and economic subjects, because one cannot believe the writers impartial or unprejudiced. No such reservation can be made, however, in regard to Judge Ben B. Lindsey's straightforward and powerful account of the genesis and development of the Denver juvenile court. His stirring story, written in collaboration with Harvey J. O'Higgins, was first published in Everybody's Magazine. It was then brought out in book form by Doubleday, Page and company, under the title, "The Beast."

Judge Lindsey will be in La Grande April 4 when he comes here under the auspices of the local Lyceum bureau and will be heard at the high school auditorium.

Reception for Roosevelt.

Berkeley, Cal., March 23.—President and Mrs. Benjamin Ide Wheeler of the university of California held a reception in Heart Hall this afternoon in honor of Colonel and Mrs. Theodore Roosevelt. Colonel Roosevelt is here to deliver the series of Earl lectures at the university.

San Francisco, March 23.—The Commonwealth club of this city is making elaborate arrangements for a dinner and reception next Monday evening in honor of Theodore Roosevelt. The ex-president will deliver an informal address at the function, which will take place at the Fairmont hotel.

Holds Its Meeting in Columbus.

Columbus, O., March 23.—The Central Electric Railway association held its annual convention in this city today. The meeting was attended by executive and operating officials of many of the leading interurban lines of Indiana, Ohio and Michigan.

Rare Confederate Stamps.

New York, March 23.—The most notable sale of rare confederate states postage stamps that has ever taken place in this city was begun today. The collection is that of the late Phillip La Tourette. The stamps are all of the provisional issues. Among the choicest items in the collection are the Abingdon, Va., five-cent, on orange paper, and the Autaugaville (Ala.), five-cent, on white paper. Many other rare varieties are included in the collection some of them valued as high as \$250 each.

Kaiser's Daughter to Visit England.

London, March 23.—In response to a special invitation from King George and Queen Mary, Princess Victoria Louise of Prussia will accompany Emperor William and the German empress on their visit to London in May to attend the dedication of the Queen Victoria memorial. It will be the first visit of the princess to England.

Ambassador Reid Returns to England.

New York, March 23.—Among the notables sailing for England today were Lady Sarah Wilson, Mrs. William B. Leeds and Ambassador and Mrs. Whiteleaw Reid.
