WEED LECTURE ON TUESDAY

L. D. S. TABERNACLE TO BE THE MEETING PLACE.

Neighborhood Club Not After Money but Seeks Civic Benefit.

"The More Beautiful La Grande" is the title of a lecture to be given by Howard Everts Weed on Tuesday evening, March 28th, at the L. D. S. tabernacle, under the auspices of the Neighborhood club.

The Neighborhood club is a civic club as well as a literary club, a fact well demonstrated in the past by having given Aster shows and helping in other ways along civic lines.

The object of Mr. Weed's lecture is to assist La Grande along civic lines. It hopes by this inspiring talk to assist in the movement already started in La Grande for clean streets and more beautiful homes.

The lecture will be illustrated by over 100 stereopticon views showing what is being done in various localities. At the close of the lecture the local application of these subjects will be mentioned bringing out the particular needs of La Grande. The price of admission, 25 cents, has been placed as low as possible and yet to cover expenses of the lecture, as the club is not giving this for the purpose of swelling its treasury but to give La Grande a lecture which every citizen interested in the welfare of the city and in beautifying the homes of our town should hear.

EDUCATION FACES SET-BACK

PRESIDENT CAMPBELL WRITES OF PROPOSED REFERENDUM.

'State Again Being Brought Into Envyable Notoriety by Attack.'

The faculty of Oregon university at Eugene is apprehensive as to the results which might come to the institution if the proposed referendum vote should be had on the appropriations for maintenance of the university.

President Campbell, writing to Manager Chapman, of the Commercial club, deprecates the movement, relates a Portland paper. He fears that such effort would react upon the state, and thinks that such an influence, just now when colonists are flocking in here would be of the greatest injury. Some points he makes are as follows:

"We feel sure that not only will the educational interests of Oregon be seriously injured if these appropriations are held up for two years, but also that the state will be brought into unenviable notoriety throughout the union, and that we shall lose many good people who are at present looking toward Oregon as a future home, and much capital which might seek investment here. A condition of unrest in the next two years would certainly not prove attractive to possible immigrants, and they might easily be diverted to either Washington or California.

"If the Commercial clubs of Cottage Grove and McMinnville could be shown the dangers which these movements are bringing upon the state they might be persuaded to use their influence with their fellow-townsmen against the movements which have been inaugurated. I am inclined to think that already there is some wavering at McMinnville. The situation at Cottage Grove seems rather more threatening, as there apparently is a determined feeling there to invoke the referendum against the university.

"It is to be hoped that the local committees at these places may ultimately be persuaded to give up their efforts toward referending the appropriations."
