EMPTY PRISON BY PARDON WAY

WEST WILL NOT PERMIT DEFICIENCIES, HE SAYS.

Because Institution Is Filled, Will Pardon to Make Room.

A recent Salem news special says that in carrying out the policy announced by the state board that no deficiencies will be allowed at the state institutions, Governor West will inaugurate one of the most drastic moves ever attempted in the state in connection with the state penitentiary, and will prevent deficiencies at that institution by a liberal use of the pardoning power.

At present the prison is filled to overflowing, there being 475 inmates. During the last two or three months there has been an unprecedented increase which has filled every available space.

Ever Tier Filled.

In his report Superintendent James showed an average of 412, the greatest in the history of the state up to that time. Under the present conditions, which have arisen since the legislative session, there are 475, creating the necessity of stowing prisoners away in the fourth tier, high above the windows, which collects all of the foul air arising from the tiers underneath. In this fourth tier are a few extra cells that have never before been used.

Funds Not Ample.

Superintendent James recommended to the legislature that 48 new cells be installed and that a maintenance appropriation be given the prison, this being on a basis of 450 prisoners. The legislature reduced this figure arbitrarily to \$142,000, and as a result the conditions are such that the appropriation will not be sufficient to cover the needs of the prison.

With these facts confronting him, Governor West declares that he intends to make good his declaration that there will be no deficiencies.

Pardons May Be Remedy.

He sees only one method for remedying the conditions—that is to keep the number of prisoners down to a basis where the \$142,000 will provide plenty of food, plenty of clothing and plenty of sustenance for inmates at the penitentiary. There is a single way in which this can be accomplished, and that is by frequent and wholesale pardons, when this is considered necessary by the executive, and this plan will be followed.

ENTERPRISE PLANS TO IMPROVE.

Lawn About the Court House There to Be Shaped Up and Repaired.

A force of men and teams began grading the court house yard Monday and the work will be rapidly pushed under the direction of David Reavis until completed, according to the Enterprise News-Record.

Mr. Reavis drew the plans for beautifying of the grounds surrounding the court house that he submitted to the county court. That body gave them its instant and entire approval and ordered the work to proceed at once.

The plans call for a handsome sloping lawn from the court house to the four sides of the block. The entire block will be surrounded by an 8-foot cement walk, with 3-foot lawn and one-foot cement curb. From the southwest corner to the northwest corner a cement walk leads in a sweeping curve past the main entrance, and a similarly curved walk sweeps past the east entrance. A driveway curves past the south side of the building. A fountain is placed south and another north of the court house and over beds, trees, etc., help give the grounds a beautiful appearance.

Notice of Street Improvement.

To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the Common Council of the City of La Grande, Oregon, on the 5th day of August, 1909, creating Improvement District No. 3 and designating Main avenue, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 15th day of March, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Main avenue, in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon bitulthic pavement, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefitted by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Main avenue, from the west side of 4th street, to the west side of First Street.

(A) And the property affected or benefitted by said improvement is as follows:

All the property between the south line of Main avenue and a line drawn from Fourth street west through the center of blocks 10 and 13 in Grandy's addition to La Grande, Oregon, to the center of block 2 in Romig's addition to the town of La Grande, Oregon, and all the property between the north line of Main avenue and a line drawn from Fourth street west through the center of blocks 1, 9 and 14 in Grandy's addition to the town of La Grande, Oregon, to the center of block 1 in Romig's addition to the town of La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefitted by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$12,230.00.
