RUSSIA SATISFIED FOR A TIME.

 London, March 28.—Pekin dispatches say that China has granted every Russian demand save the establishment of a Russian consulate at Kobdo. These concessions are expected to satisfy Russia temporarily, but fresh difficulties are anticipated as a result of Russian syndicates' mining in southeast China. The Times today says it believes Japan and Russia will soon jointly present Manchurian demands which will result in an armed clash.

 San Antonio, March 28.—Madero said the insurgents will demand that Diaz resign within a few months after peace is declared; also that De La Barre become provisional president until the election, which will be held soon after he takes the presidency. Some army officers profess to believe that Diaz has decided to resign, and will keep the United States army here until the new government is firmly on the saddle.

UNUSUAL TASK PERFORMED

OPERATION OF CESARIAN SECTION PERFORMED AT HOSPITAL.
Child Born Today Under MacDuff-Like Circumstances at Hospital.

The operation of Cesarian section was performed this morning on a local lady at the Grande Ronde hospital in this city by Doctors M. K. Hall, N. Molitor and C. T. Bacon. The mother and baby are doing well this afternoon.
 Such operations were first performed in 1834, on one occasion, and then not again until 1890 when it was successfully performed by S. Kelly of Baltimore. In recent years, with the assistance of the aseptic methods taught the medical profession by Lord Lister of London, it has been frequently performed successfully by leading surgeons, and even occasionally in emergency under adverse circumstances by those not accustomed to major surgical operations.
 It is a good exemplification of the broadening lines within which surgical procedure may nowadays be safely adopted.

GOODWIN DIVORCE UPHELD.

Supreme Court Holds That Goodwin Must Not Marry in New York.
 New York, March 28.—Judge Giergerich of the supreme court today affirmed the report of Referee Thompson and granted an interlocutory decree of divorce to Edna Goodrich from Nat Goodwin, the actor. Goodwin is forbidden to marry within this state while Edna lives and she is allowed to resume her maiden name and marry whenever she wishes.

Alaska Coal Land Cases.
 Seattle, Wash., March 28.—The first of the so-called Alaska coal land fraud cases, resulting from indictments returned by the federal grand jury last fall, were called in court today for trial. The defendants are C. F. Munday, Archie W. Shields, Karl Sigley and Algernon S. Stracy. The charge against the four men is conspiracy to defraud the United States government out of Alaska coal lands valued at more than \$1,000,000.

University First With Five Victories.
 Eugene, Ore., March 27.—The Inter-Collegiate Oratorical association, composed of the eight leading colleges of Oregon, has been in existence for 19 years. Nineteen contests have been held. The university of Oregon leads with five victories to her credit. Pacific college and McMinnville college tie for second place, with four first places each. Willamette university, Pacific university and Albany college tie for third place, with two victories each. The Oregon agricultural college and the Monmouth normal school have been unfortunate, neither of them ever having won a first place. In the last five years, the state university has won first place twice, and second place the other three years.

Florida Sunday Schools.
 Tallahassee, Fla., March 28.—An enthusiastic host of Sunday school workers rallied here today for the annual convention of the Florida State Sunday School association. At the formal opening of the gathering this afternoon the speakers included Governor Gilchrist and President H. B. Minium of Jacksonville, together with an imposing array of educators representing all of the leading colleges and schools of Florida. At the subsequent sessions of the convention, which will last over tomorrow and Thursday, there will be addresses by several Sunday school experts of national reputation. Prof. E. O. Excell of Chicago is in charge of the musical features of the program.

To Prevent Mine Merger.
 Grand Rapids, Mich., March 28.—In the United States district court today Judge Swann listened to arguments on the application of Godfrey M. Hyams of New York for an injunction against the Calumet and Hecla Mining company to prevent its merger with the Osceola company. The petitioner asks that the proposed consolidation be declared null and void, as an attempt to form an unlawful trust, or monopoly, and the combination of capital in restraint of trade. Mr. Hyams, who has been prominently identified with the manage-

ment of the Osceola properties, declares that, if the merger plan is carried out, it will work an injustice to Osceola stockholders and result in a great financial loss to them.

CHINAMAN ON TRIAL.

White Woman Charged With Occupying Chinese Quarters With Him
 China Tom, a noodle stand proprietor in Chinatown and Ethel Gray, a denizen of the underworld, are charged with illegal cohabitation in a house in the Chinese section by Chief of Police Walden, and the Chinaman was placed on trial this afternoon before Judge Humphreys in city police court. City Attorney Cochran is handling the city's charges and Turner Oliver is defending the Chinaman. The evidence indicated that the Chinaman and white woman were in the house when the place was raided, but the defense stipulates that she was awaiting the completion of a meal which was taken as a substitute to noodles of which the Chinaman was just then out.

Mormons Are Accused.

London, March 28.—Mormons in Europe are striving to send immigrants to Utah in order to overcome the growing Anti-Mormon vote in Utah, declared H. P. Freese today, of the international reform bureau of Washington who is in charge of the work of driving Mormon missionaries from Europe. Every Mormon woman, after a ten year's residence, becomes a voter. A large number of Mormon converts is expected soon to leave Denmark, Holland and Germany for Utah.

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 27.—Friday night of this week, simultaneously at Seattle, Stamford and Eugene, the debating teams of the three institutions, Washington, Stamford, and Oregon, will clash in debate on the shipping subsidies question. North Dakota Judge on Trial.

Bismarck, N. D., March 28.—The first impeachment trial that has taken place in this section of the country in many years convened here today to try Judge John F. Cowan, of the second judicial district of North Dakota. Articles of impeachment against Judge Cowan were filed with the legislature several weeks ago and that body immediately took the steps necessary to bring about a trial of the case. Eight charges have been brought against the defendant. The first trial is that of habitual drunkenness. The other charges relate to alleged acts in violation of the laws of the state, the alleged use of indecent language in public and various other offenses injurious to public morals.
