MURDERED GIRL DISCOVERED

CONTRACTOR FINDS REMAINS IN ROSE CITY PARK.

Gunshot Wound in Temple Indicates Murder of Young Girl.

J. P. O'Neill, a street contractor doing some work in the Rose City district, reported to the police at 10 o'clock this afternoon that he had just found the body of a young girl, apparently about 15 or 16 years of age, half hidden in the brush back from the street some distance and about seven blocks north from the Rose City park car line on Sandy road, says yesterday's Portland Telegram. The body was lying near East Forty-seventh street. That section is sparsely settled and is being improved and graded. She apparently had been murdered.

A gunshot wound was found in the right temple, and it appeared to those who discovered the remains that the girl had not been dead longer than perhaps last evening. Her clothing was not disarranged in any manner, and no evidence of a struggle was to be found at the scene of the tragedy. The dead girl wore a plaid dress and a blue cape, but had no hat on, nor could any be found near. This latter fact has caused the police to believe that she resides near.

Mr. O'Neill is doing grading work near the place where the body was discovered. A man came to him this afternoon when he and his force of men started to work, and said that a dead girl lay in the brush near. Mr. O'Neill went with the man to the spot, and verified the statement. He immediately notified the police, and asked the man to remain until the officers arrived which the stranger did. When Patrolman Evans reached the scene, he took the stranger into custody, although there is no evidence to implicate him. The officers thought it best to hold him until further details could be worked out.

For several days, Mr. O'Neill says, the man has been seeking work of him. He evidently was bent upon the same mission when approaching the grading crew this morning, when he says he saw the body for the first time. His demeanor is calm, and no one suggests that he is guilty of the crime.

An alarm was quickly spread throughout the neighborhood of Rose City park, and a canvass is in progress to learn if the dead girl lived there. As soon as her identity is discovered, the officers will have something on which to work. Those who saw the body believe it is that of a schoolgirl who was enticed into the brush by a jealous youth or person of more evil intent, and then shot down, perhaps before some other purpose could be carried out.

The dress of the dead girl is very good, indicating that she comes of good family. Her face has the appearance of refinement and education. From the hasty examination made by the first policeman to arrive on the spot, there is no suspicion of assault.

BOND MONEY IS RECEIVED

DRAFT MONEY COVERING LAST BOND ISSUE ARRIVES HERE.

Total Bonded Indebtedness of La Grande Is Now \$285,000.

Nine thousand, six hundred seven dollars and seventy-eight cents, representing the additional bond issue, have been received by City Recorder Humphreys from E. H. Rollins & Sons, bond buyers who took over the last bond issue, and the bonds which this sum purchases, will be forwarded to Denver at once. The money came in the form of a demand draft yesterday and the city is now in position to pick up the leave-over expense accounts from the construction of the sewer system. The original issue of \$40,000 was not sufficient.

This makes a total of \$285,000 as the bonded indebtedness of the city of La Grande up to date. The aggregate is composed of \$160,000 Beaver creek bonds; \$40,000 original sewer bonds; \$25,000 city hall bonds; \$50,000 refunding on old water bonds; and the last, \$10,000 additional sewer bonds.

ELGIN TAKES LESSONS.

City Attorney of Sister Town Here to Study Filing Systems.

The manner of handling bond issues, filing systems and a volume of other office detail such as is becoming a necessity at Elgin due to the proposed sale of city hall bonds there were studied here last evening and this morning in a conference between City Attorney L. Denham of Elgin and City Recorder Humphrey of this city.

Mr. Humphrey gave all the information on the matter desired and Mr. Denham is now able to convey to the Elgin council and recorder the manner of handling the vast amount of detail, resulting from bond issues and other city improvements.

Tags Selling Slowly.

SUSPECT SEEMS INNOCENT.

Haines People Cannot Identify the Suspect at Baker Jail.

Ed. Smith was arrested in Portland Saturday by Detective Endicott on the suspicion of being able to throw some light on the mystery of the murder of Edward McCullough at Haines on the night of February 28, relates the Baker Democrat.

There is not much evidence that Smith is connected with the crime, he being wanted by the local officers because he was in the city about the time of the crime and disappeared soon after. He is a bad man and is said to have seen penitentiary service. He will be made to give an account of his movements previous to and following the crime.

A large number of Haines men and others visited the county jail yesterday afternoon, including some who

were present in the saloon when McCullough was killed, but none were able to identify him as one of the pair of holdups.
