With her victim at bay, Mrs. Brooks second ball struck Mrs. Binford in higher, and the fourth entered the base of the neck, shattering the spinal vertebra. Just before her victim sank to the floor, Mrs. Brooks fired again the bullet striking Mrs. Binford behind the ear, coming out through the top of the head

There were probably a hundred or more witnesses to the tragedy. Shoppers and cierks alike seemed to be paralyzed by hysterical fright and without hindrance Mrs. Brooks passed through the crowd and reached the cffice of her husband, two blocks distant. She handed the revolver to her husband and with the murmured words "I am sorry." she sank to the floor unconscious. Later she was arrested and after waiving a preliminary trial, was released under \$10 .-000 ball.
