BIG CORTEGE AT FUNERAL

SEVERAL HUNDRED LODGEMEN ACT AS ESCORTS TO REMAINS.

Late G. E. Fowler Laid to Rest With Fitting Tributes This Afternoon.

An escort of several hundred lodgemen formed a cortege this afternoon that conveyed the remains of the late G. E. Fowler to the last resting place. From the residence in North La Grande to the Presbyterian church where the services were conducted, a cortege consisting of about 100 Elks, in the vanguard, city officials past and present forming another detachment about 50 Modern Woodmen of America, the third detachment and last came about 100 I. O. O. F. which had general supervision of the burial services. Rev. W. S. Seemann officiated at the church.

Mrs. Fowler, the widow, previously ill for months—was in a state of almost total collapse and had to be brought to the church in an automobile in advance of the cortege. Her condition is deemed critical.

At the conclusion of brief services in the church fraternal burial services were carried out at the grave.

Mr. Fowler was born in Jefferson county, Kansas, in 1860, thus attaining the age of 51 years at the time of his death. Twenty-five years ago he moved to the Grande Ronde valley and has lived here continually with the exception of about two years which he spent in Wyoming. He is survived by his wife, several brothers and sisters. Two of his brothers are here to attend the funeral, namely, B. C. Fowler of Seattle and I. G. Fowler of Luray, Kansas. Other brothers are F. Fowler of Iowa and R. T. Fowler of Kansas. Two sisters live in Kansas and Miss Ada Fowler of this city is also a sister of the deceased. Ralph Fowler, the O-W passenger brakeman on the Pendleton-Huntington run is a nephew of the deceased.

Prominent in Lodges.

The I. O. O. F., the Modern Wood-

men of America and the Elks lodge were all his personal hobbies and he has been closely affiliated with all of them. He has been through all the chairs in the I. O. O. F. lodge and was the last delegate to the grand lodge.

Was Councilman Twice.

At various times Mr. Fowler was affiliated with the affairs of the city's administration. He was councilman at two different times in recent years and gave a great deal of attention to the Beaver Creek project when it was in its infancy. During the last two years he has been devoting his entire time to his extensive dray and wood and coal business in this city.

A Worthy Woman at Rest.

The funeral of Mrs. A. J. Martin occurred on Monday afternoon, April 3, 1911, from the family home, No. 1201 Fourth street, this city. The gathering of old friends and acquaintances was generous and taxed the capacity of the house and front lawn. Reverend Doctor W. S. Seemann, pastor of the Presbyterian church, conducted the services, assisted by the choir of that denomination which sang "Asleep in Jesus," "Rock of Ages," and "Lead, Kindly Light." The casket was covered with flowers, lovely carnations—the deceased's favorite flower—predominating.

Mrs. Clementina A. Martin, nee Swygart, was born in Cleveland, Ohio, October 14, 1858. Her family moved to South Bend, Indiana, which was the family home for many years and thence to Dixon, Ill., where on June 14, 1903, she was married to A. J. Martin, the O-W storekeeper of La Grande. Coming to La Grande at that time, this city has been her home ever since, and during this time she became endeared to a few close friends as she was of a very quiet and unassuming disposition, preferring the home association to affairs outside. She is survived by the husband and one daughter, Irma, the latter being a bright and popular member of the sophomore class of the local high school. There are near relatives living at Los Angeles, Cal., St. Paul, Minn.; Chicago, Ill., and South Bend and Elkhart, Ind.
