TAFT URGED TO DESIST "WAR"

LOCAL SOCIALISTS PASS RESOLUTION CONDEMNING POLICY.

Calls Mobilization an Insult to All Liberty Loving People.

The local socialist party has passed a resolution dealing with the maneuvers of troops on the Texas border. The resolution says in detail.

La Grande, Ore., March 28.—To His Excellency, William H. Taft, president of the United States: Sir—We, socialists of La Grande, Ore., cannot longer refrain from voicing our indignation at your acts in relation to Mexico.

"Call Off the Dogs of War."
This mobilization of troops along the Mexican border is an insult to all liberty loving citizens of the United States, whose ancestors once fought for their religious and political freedom.

Let the common people, the peons, slaves of Mexico free themselves from their yoke of tyranny, from their barbarous despots, without intimidation from a sister republic, whose Statue of liberty stands lighting the world.

What cause have we to war at the decree of those capitalists who have invested their wealth in Mexico, who have bought the fruitful soil and enslaved a liberty loving people to satisfy the insatiable greed and fill the coffers of tyrannical barbarians.

You say: "We must protect American interests." What interests have we, the common people of this country, to protect in Mexico? What interests the government? Our lands have not been laid waste, our citizens terrorized, our country invaded. No laws of neutrality have been violated. No speculative Mexican adventurers or ring of industrial freebooters warrants this country in interfering with the political destinies of Mexico, which these commercial vultures have invaded and despoiled upon their own responsibility.

If this be treason, then the lust for gain and greed have usurped liberty and independence has become an empty mockery.

6000 EUGENERS HEAR TEDDY

SCHOOLS, FORESTS AND BABIES ROOSEVELT'S THEME.

Students Urged to Be Loyal—Shower of Roses Follow Train.

University of Oregon, Eugene, April 5.—(Special)—The "forests," the "referendum," and "the babies." These were the subjects which ex-President Roosevelt discussed in a 12-minute talk at the Southern Pacific depot today, on his way north. The ex-president was most warmly greeted by a crowd of 6,000 townspeople and students, and when the Shasta Limited pulled out from the Eugene station, the back platform and its occupants were literally showered with Willamette valley flowers.

President Campbell of the state university introduced the famous speaker. Roosevelt began by discussing the referendum in Oregon, and the use that is being made of it in an attempt to uphold the state university funds. He said:

"I am, and always have been, a strong supporter of the referendum. It's a fine thing—but don't spoil it by upholding higher learning in the state. Education must not and cannot be stopped, and men, in this case, don't support the referendum."

He spoke on the forest problem in keynote of his remarks. "The forests Oregon, and conservation was the must be preserved at any cost and by any means, for citizens of Oregon, you are going to need them in your business," said the ex-president, characteristically.

He spoke briefly to the large crowd

of students, impressing upon their minds their duty to the state to "make good," and as the Shasta continued its journey northward, amid deafening applause, he closed his remarks with his famous congratulatory words concerning the "baby crop" of Oregon.

The president is looking hale and hearty. He seemed a little travel worn, and was just a little bit hoarse; the result of his many speeches on his triumphant coastal tour. He is just as optimistic and genial as ever and looks as young as he did ten years ago.
