Lectures on Poultry Raising.

Corvallis, Ore., April 7.—(Special).—Alfred G. Lunn, of Camden, N. J., who is instructor in the poultry department at the Oregon Agricultural college is to give a series of five illustrated lectures on poultry raising in Portland under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and the Portland Junior Poultry club, an organization on which is the outgrowth of the young people's poultry contest started there a year ago by the college.

Mr. Lunn's first lecture, April 7, will be on "The Poultry Industry in Oregon." He will speak April 14 on "Locating and Constructing the Poultry Plant;" April 21 on "Selecting and Reproducing a Flock;" April 28 on "Feeds and Feeding;" and May 5 on "Preparing and Marketing Poultry Products."

These are to be free lectures, and will be given in the evening, in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium, that all who are interested in the advancement of

the poultry industry in Oregon may have an opportunity to attend.

Notice of Street Improvement.

To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 1st day of December, 1909, creating improvement district No. 9 and designating Fourth street as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the first day of February, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Fourth street, in said improvement district as hereinafter described by laying thereon macadam, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefitted by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Fourth street, from the south side of D avenue, to the north side of C avenue.

(A) And the property affected or benefitted by said improvement is as follows: All the property between the west line of Fourth street and a line drawn from O avenue, south through the center of blocks 74, 75, and the block used by school district No. 1, and block 88, 89 and 96, Chaplin's addition and block 11, 10 and 1, Arnolds & Drays addition and blocks 5 and 4, Arnolds addition and block 4-B-st., original town of La Grande, and all the property between the east line of Fourth street and the west line of Fifth street, including all of blocks 59, 58, 51, 50, 41, 40; 31; 30; 21; 20; 11 and 10, Chaplin's addition, all being in the city of La Grande, Union county, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefitted by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$15,070.00. That the council will on the 19th day of April, 1911, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
