JUDGE HANDFORD'S COAL LAND RULING OPPOSED BY RUDKIN

Spokane, April 15.—Judge Rudkin today overruled demurrer filed by Charles Doughton, Charles McKenzie, Harry White and Raymond Brown regarding the coal lands in Alaska and takes an opposite stand from the federal judge, Handford, of Seattle, who quashed the indictment charging the defendants with conspiring to defraud the government of coal lands worth \$10,000,000. 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O-W EMPLOYEE IS SENTENCED

MAN FORMERLY EMPLOYED IN BAGGAGE ROOM PLEADS GUILTY

Cashes Certificate of Deposit Intend d For Another Blair.

Earl Blair faces two years in the penitentiary as a result of pleading guilty to forgery in connection with the cashing of a certificate of deposit of about \$100 in an eastern bank. Some time ago Blair, who was employed in the O. W. baggage department here for a few months, was arrested on complaint of Agent Kenney for cashing a certificate which belonged to another Blair. It seems that

the money was sent from the east to a man by the name of Blair and it came to Earl Blair by mistake. He cashed the paper by presenting it at the ticket office window where Clerk Barren, unsuspecting, converted the paper into cash. The paper went through the bank here, went to the east and soon after the error was found. A tracer located the difficulty here and Blair was arrested. He pleaded guilty today and was sentenced to two years.
