

AUTO HITS TEAM AND TIPS

SPEEDING ON ADAMS AVENUE COMES NEAR BEING FATAL.

Driver Smith and E. E. Daniels Slightly Injured in Auto Spill.

Converting Adams avenue in race courses came near proving disastrous to an automobile, a delivery wagon, a horse, and lastly three people Saturday evening and but by a fortunate swerve of the careening runaway automobile this list of things and people would have come to serious grief.

Various statements have been made relative to the cause of the near disaster which ended in the slight injury to the auto driver, a Mr. Smith, an employee of the L. C. Smith garage, and E. E. Daniels, deliveryman for the A. B. C. laundry. The automobile, a Ford, was slightly damaged and the left broadside of the delivery wagon came to grief somewhat.

Sifted down to facts it appears that the automobile went wrong and that the steering gear was out of order while the machine was whizzing toward town closely behind the Lynn Bohnenkamp machine. About a half block separated them. The Bohnenkamp machine passed the delivery wagon safely but the second machine was taking so much of the street by its swerving that the vehicle driver could not determine in the moment's time which side the machine was going to pass. When the whole outfit seemed about to come together with disastrous results, the automobile took a peculiar turn, skidding around sideways and tipped against the wagon, thus saving the lives of all. As it was Daniels was thrown several yards. The automobile came to a halt lying crossways of the street between the delivery wagon and the curbing, indicating that there was room enough to pass. Good fortune cropped out at various places and for that reason the outcome was really trivial, where it might easily have been fatal. Ray

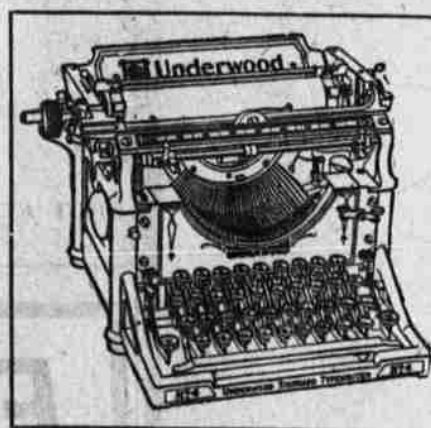
