

BENSON LAID TO REST AT HOME TOWN TODAY

GOVERNOR AND BENSON'S SUCCESSOR AT FUNERAL.

Squad of Militia Guards Body on Arrival at Roseburg.

Roseburg, April 18.—F. W. Benson's funeral was held this forenoon under the auspices of the Elks at the Elks' temple. Several thousand followed the body to the grave in the Odd Fellows cemetery where the last rites of Odd Fellowship were administered.

Among the mourners were Governor West and Secretary of State Olcott. The body arrived at midnight and was escorted to the temple by a squad of company D, national guard. They maintained a guard until the services.

Troops May Be Called Out to Maintain Order at Zion.

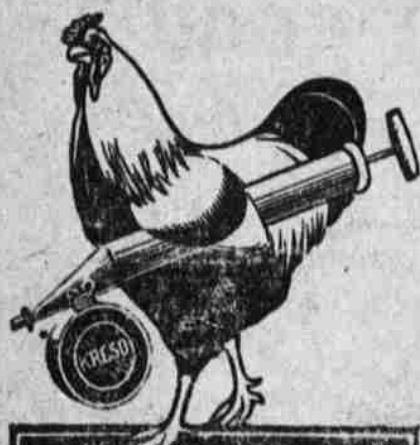
Zion City, April 18.—After a day of the wildest excitement in which there was much rioting and many voters slugged, Wilbur Glenn Voliva, successor of Dowd as chief of the Zionists, this afternoon claims he has been elected mayor over K. S. Goudie, candidate for the wide open faction. Independent of any trouble will come if it is found that Voliva is beaten as it is reported. The Voliva men have arsenals and threaten bloodshed in such event.

So serious was the outlook this afternoon that troops may be called to quell the rioters. Mayor Rithie has asked Governor Deneen to insure protection and the governor said if the police were unable to handle the situation help would be forthcoming.

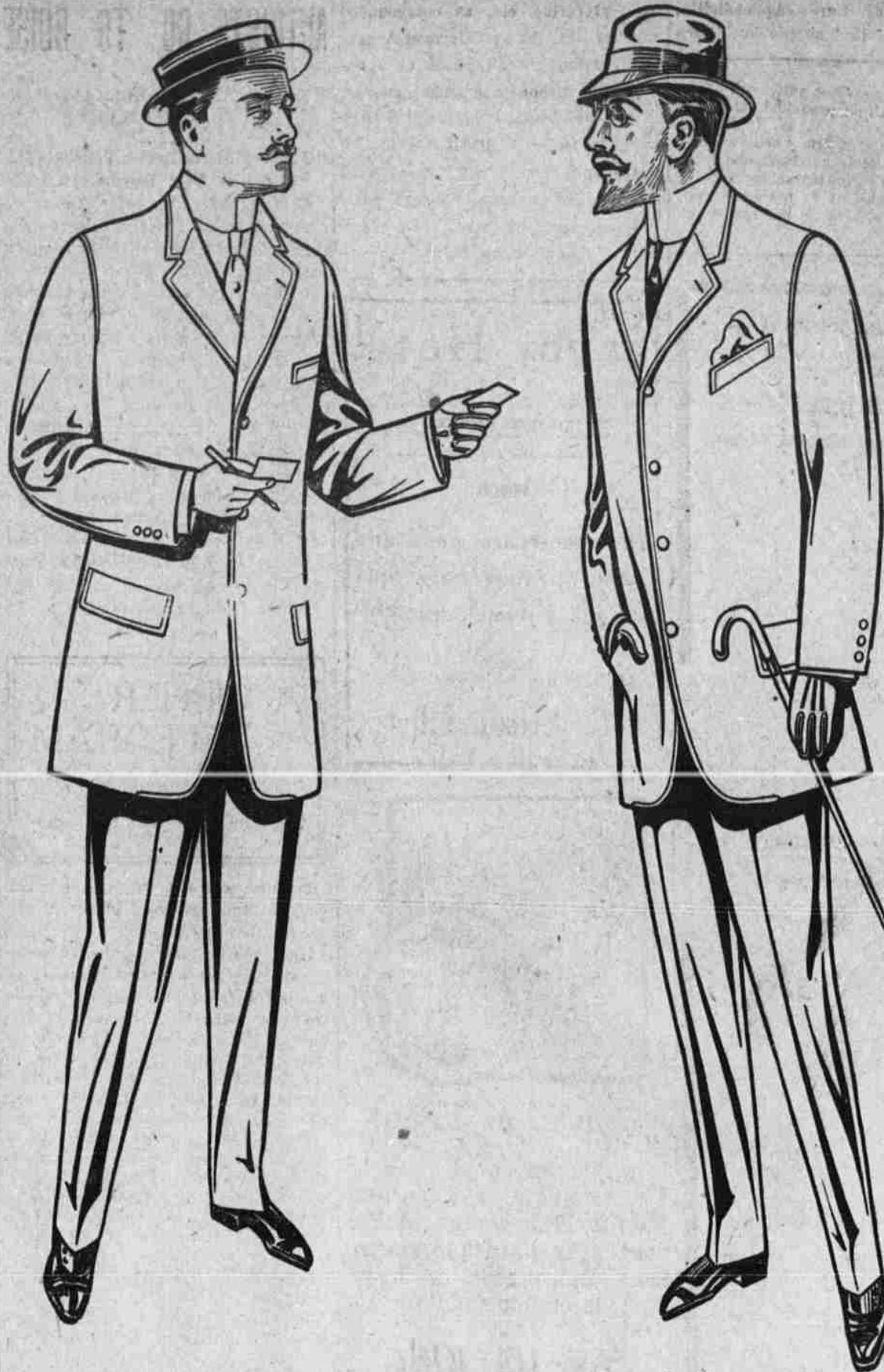

CRAZED FATHER DOG POISONING MURRAY DUO IS SLAUGHTERS CASE IS ON FREED BY JURY

WIFE AND FOUR CHILDREN ARE DYING, OTHERS DYING.

Driven Into Insanity by Coming Blindness, Workman Runs Amuck.

Youngston, Ohio, April 18.—Fearing approaching blindness would make it impossible for him to support his family and writing a note he was going crazy, Grandt Rickett, a plumber, today murdered his wife and two children, Pearl aged 8 and Raymond, aged 5; and fatally injured his children Charlotte, aged 11, Helen, aged 15, and maimed Edwin aged 16, for life with an ax, and then killed himself with a revolver. He left a note saying he would rather kill them than leave them unsupported.

Charlotte and Helen died later in the day.

TWO MEN ACCUSED OF THROWING POISON TO CANINES.

Nate Zweifel Is Complaining Witness In Jury Trial.

An alleged dog poisoning case is now to occupy the attention of the circuit court. Messrs. Evans and Smith, two employees of the sewer construction work in East La Grande, were put on trial today charged with poisoning Nate Zweifel's family dog. The case will attract considerable attention and the jury is being picked late this afternoon.

It is said by the state's witnesses that the two men threw poison to the dog which was in the residence yard. The two men were arrested some time since and given preliminary hearing in justice court.

FIRING AT JUAREZ TODAY

Two Towns Awake to See Commencement of Battle at Early Hour.

El Paso, April 18.—Heralded by desultory firing from the hill opposite the El Paso smelter the battle for possession of Juarez began today. The first shots were fired before sunrise and shooting continued until morning. The federal outposts retreated steadily to Thel Uilleb but it is expected Madero's main forces arrive before this afternoon.

Two Cities Keep Awake.

Few persons slept in El Paso or

Juarez last night, expecting an attack to start during the night. This morning the exact whereabouts of Madero were unknown. Sixteen hundred insurgents were known to be at Baucha last night when they were being loaded into trains for the north. It is believed these trains are in the southern outskirts of Juarez and the firing came from them as they took their positions.

Colonel Tambourel, chief of arms at Juarez, declared that 1,000 insurgents have been located 12 miles south of Juarez. He said he expected a battle today. Consul Wards telegraphed to Washington that a clash was impending.
