She had been supporting Miss Ruby Huff but several friends persuaded her that there are prizes enough for La Grande candidates so that both she and Miss Huff can receive gifts, so she allowed the votes to be counted. The friends who talked her into the notion immediately sent votes to be credited to Mrs. Nutter. So that now she is properly in the race.

Miss Mildred Stephenson (the sweet mezzo soprano singer of the Star theatre, was given a position in the contest by admiring friends, who, by contest votes, wish to show their appreciation of her qualities as a singer and entertainer. Miss Stephenson resides with her mother in La Grande and both have the acquaintance of

some of the finest people of the city since they came here two months ago. Miss Jennie Carbine is a new arrival in the contest constellation.

Fruitdale Candidate.

Miss Jennie Carbine of Fruitdale, R. F. D. No. 1, was nominated by several residents of her part of the Grande Ronde valley, who want their rural letter route represented in the contest columns of the Observer. Although precipitated into the contest by her neighbors, Miss Carbine says she will do her best to give her locality creditable representation.

Miss Carbin is a member of a well-known family. Her father, E. J. Carbine, and her brother, E. W. Carbine, have done business with orchardists and farmers in all parts of the valley. The elder Carbine is now in Sinaloa, Mexico, developing a farm. Measurement of Subscriptions.

For convenience in estimating the relative standing of contestants, subscriptions to the Observer are measured out into votes, according to the length of time paid for. Old subscribers as well as new, by paying arrears or by paying in advance or by paying both in advance and arrears, may help the candidates. A blank for the convenience of those who wish to vote on account of a payment on subscription in favor of a candidate is printed herewith, also a schedule of voting power of subscriptions.

Whether in advance or in arrears payments on the La Grande Evening Observer for more than one year give a premium of 3,000 extra votes for each year so paid; on the Weekly Observer a premium of 1,000 extra votes for each year so paid. The premium is the same whether the subscriber is new or old. The 3,000 votes for each extra year paid on the Evening Observer and the 1,000 votes for each extra year paid on the Weekly Observer are in addition to the ones earned by the regular schedule as printed below.

A yearly subscription of any other newspaper or magazine that clubs with the La Grande Evening or Weekly Observer, when paid with a yearly subscription to the Observer, gives 1,000 votes, in addition to the votes earned by the money applied to the Observer. Any payment made to a contestant by a person now taking the Observer extends the subscription from the date to which the subscriber was paid before the transaction with the contestant.

Oklahoma's 22nd Birthday.

Oklahoma City, Okla., April 21.—The busy and tempestuous pioneer days of Oklahoma are vividly recalled to many of the old residents, who were on the spot when the then new territory was thrown open to settlement on April 22, 1889, by the throngs attracted to this city by the two days celebration of Oklahoma's 22nd birthday. The celebration which began here today under the joint auspices of the Aprilis Fiesta company and the '89ers association, which is composed of Oklahoma pioneers who were in any part of Oklahoma at the time the territory was thrown open to settlement, will be continued tomorrow and will close with a grand banquet of the '89ers association at the auditorium. The whole city is profusely decorated and several thousand visitors have arrived here to witness the grand parade which forms the most attractive features of the two day celebration.

New York Elocutionists Meet.

Rochester, N. Y., April 21.—Elocutionists and teachers of elocution from all parts of the state are in attendance at the 12th annual convention of the New York State Association of Elocutionists, which opened at east high school for a two-day session. The convention was called to order this morning by President George C. Williams, of Ithaca and addresses of welcome were delivered by George M. Forbes, president of the board of education and Clarence F. Carroll, superintendent of schools. Then President Williams read his annual address. The rest of the session was taken up by the reading of papers upon various subjects connected with the teaching of elocution in public schools and the higher institutions of learning. The program provides for sessions in the morning, the afternoon and the evening on both days of the convention, which will close tomorrow evening with a series of recitations, giving interpretations of some of the best known selections for use in schools.

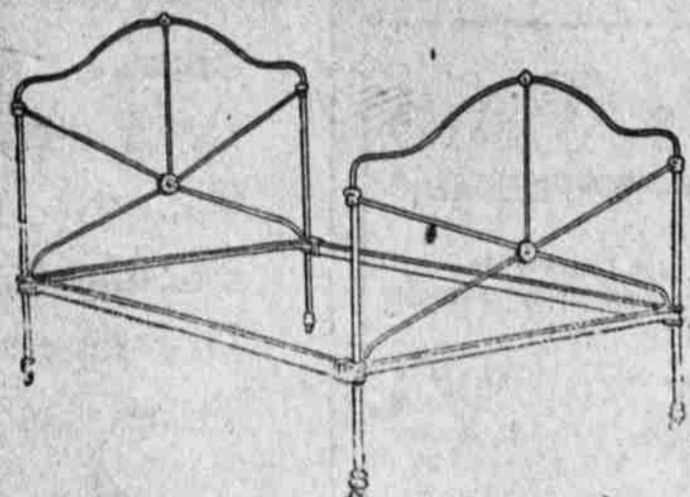
