

LABORING WORLD UP IN ARMS AT ARREST AND "ABDUCTION" OF ALLEGED TIMES DYNAMITERS

BOMBS PLANTED BY FOES OF UNIONS BOISE STRUGGLE A MODEL FOR THESE MEN MUCH ADD AT BITTER WAR IN 'FRISCO OVER COAST TOWNS TO FOLLOW

SUCH IS ACCUSATION MADE AT INDIANAPOLIS.

Grand Jury Investigates Finding of Dynamite by Burns.

Indianapolis, April 24.—The Marion county grand jury convened here today to investigate the finding of dynamite in the basement of the American Central Life building in which the office of James McNamara is located. Prosecutor Baker declared he intended to ascertain whether the explosives were planted by foes of union labor or belonging to McNamara. A message from Tiffin, Ohio, states a plant of 300 pounds of dynamite was found at McManing's home. It is reported Burns discovered it in the rear of his home in a shed.

Later Burns left for Bloomville, Ohio, where he expects to find more explosives.

Intimation that labor leaders will maintain that the evidence against the arrested trio has been deliberately planned was made here today by F. M. Ryan, of the International Bridge and Structural Ironworkers of America, following the discovery of explosives in the office building occupied by that organization.

Governor Marshall is uneasy on account of the protests of unionists. He said no more secret requisitions will be honored in connection with the Los Angeles explosion, should arrests be made in this state, unless the accused are given a hearing in this state.

Twenty-Four Entombed.

Cumberland, Md., April 24.—Twenty-four miners were entombed in the Ott mines, according to official statements, issued this afternoon.

AMERICAN CAMMERISTS IS NAME ATTACHED BY THE TIMES.

Men Will Be Tried and Acquitted as Were Moyer, et al.

Los Angeles, April 24.—That the arrest of the alleged dynamiters at Chicago Saturday evening by Detective Burns is a repetition of the Moyer-Haywood-Pettibone case and that the trial will result in their acquittal was the subject of several addresses to 100 socialists and working men last night at the labor temple. They all agreed that punishment should follow speedily if the men are really guilty.

American Cammerists.

Likening the alleged dynamite plotters to Cammerists, now on trial in Italy, the Times today devotes a column and a half to a scathing denunciation of the arrested men and also raps the union leaders and laborers, intimating the labor organizations have paid for the assassinations in the fight for open shops.

SEVERAL WITNESSES HELD IN READINESS TO TESTIFY.

Mrs. Ingersoll Says She Can Identify "Bryce" If Seen.

San Francisco, April 24.—The San Francisco end of the Times explosion developed rapidly today when it was learned that witnesses who might be able to identify James McNamara and J. B. Bryce, had been notified by the police to be ready to go to Los Angeles as soon as the suspected man arrives.

Another development was the intimation that David Caplin, indicted for the explosion, is also being held in detention at a safe Pacific coast city and will be taken to Los Angeles, Mrs. D. H. Ingersoll, from whom "Bryce" rented apartments in San Francisco prior to the Times explosion, declared today she could be certain of identification of the man if she ever saw him again.

Following the arrests of the trio of alleged dynamiters, Chief of Police Seymour said today it would not be surprising if some labor leaders were arrested here soon for having knowledge of the Times dynamiting.

Heresy Charge Against Professor.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 24.—A special meeting of the Pittsburg Presbytery went into session behind closed doors today to consider the overture directed against Professor William Adams Brown of the Union Theological seminary, New York. The overture, which was introduced by the Rev. Dr. N. L. McEwen of this city, asks for an investigation of certain alleged heretical statements made by the New York professor in reference to the bible and miracles. It is believed likely that the local Presbytery will decide to refer the overture to the Presbyterian general assembly which is to meet in annual session in Atlantic City next month.

McMANINGAL TELLS STORY OF ATROCIOUS CRIMES.

Labor Men Have Subscribed Big Sum to Fight Capital.

Chicago, April 24.—War to the knife between capital and labor on the Pacific coast with labor strengthened by a monster fund contributed by union men from all over the country, is predicted here today as the result of the arrest of John McNamara, international secretary of the Bridge and Structural Iron Workers, his brothers James and Orlie McManingal with complicity in the Los Angeles Times explosion.

Labor Leaders Accusers.

Labor leaders throughout the country denounce the method of spiriting the defendants to Los Angeles and also charge that third degree methods were wrought to make McManingal confess, which it is said recites how 100 lives were in peril and over \$500,000 worth of property was destroyed by dynamite in the war of workers against employment of non-unionists. The men are now en route to Los Angeles and will arrive there tomorrow or next day.

President Fitzpatrick, and Secretary Nickels of the Chicago Federation of Labor left today for Indianapolis where labor leaders from all over the country will meet to perfect the arrangement of McNamara's defense. Clarence Darrow, after a talk with labor men, left today, presumably for Indianapolis. It is reported he will defend McNamara.

Prisoners at Topeka.

Topeka, April 23.—Manacled to detectives, the prisoners passed through this city at 11 o'clock on the Santa Fe for Los Angeles.

Pythians Meet in Conclave.

Arlene, Texas, April 24.—A week

of unusual interest and activity in Pythian circles was inaugurated here today with the assembling of the Grand Lodge convention of the Texas Knights of Pythias. Today was devoted chiefly to the welcome and entertainment of the visitors; the program including a 150-mile automobile ride and a public reception. The Grand Lodge will begin its business sessions tomorrow. The Pythian Sisters of the state are holding their annual meeting in conjunction with the Grand Lodge. The business section of the city is elaborately decorated in honor of the visitors.

Investigating Telegraph Rates.

Toronto, Ont., April 24.—Results of an important and widespread nature are expected from the official investigation which was begun by the railway commission in this city today into the rates and methods of the telegraph companies doing business in Canada. Investigation is due to a complaint made by the Winnipeg board of trade but the issues involved are of general interest throughout the dominion.

Naval V. Flag at Newport.

Newport, R. I., April 24.—The presence of many naval officers in full dress uniform added brilliance to the wedding here today of Miss Marjorie Hobbs, daughter of Rear Admiral and Mrs. I. Goodwin Hobbs, and Ezra Gould, a prominent banker of Washington, D. C. The ceremony took place at the Hobbs home this afternoon, the officiating clergyman being the Rev. George R. Hazard, of Manchester, N. H., an uncle of the bride.

Florida Press Association.

Tallahassee, Fla., April 24.—Many prominent newspaper publishers and editors are in Tallahassee today, called here by the annual meeting of the Florida Press association. Beginning tonight, the sessions will continue over tomorrow and Wednesday and will include addresses by a number of prominent speakers. Harry Brown, of St. Augustine, is the president of the association and the presiding officer at the convention.

Child Welfare Congress.

Washington, April 24.—Delegates and visitors representing ten countries have arrived in Washington to attend the second international congress on Child Welfare, which is to begin its sessions tomorrow under the auspices of the National Congress of Mothers. The gathering will last seven days. The list of speakers includes a number of world's experts on questions affecting the care of dependant and delinquent children, and diplomats, statesmen and sociologists of wide reputation. President Taft will receive the delegates at the white house next Monday afternoon.

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OREGON LAND GRANT REVERTS TO GOVERNMENT BY DECISION OF PORTLAND JUDGE

Portland, Ore., April 24.—The government in the suit for recovery of land was originally granted to the 2,500,000 acres of land in southern Oregon-California Railroad by Congress in the late sixties, under an agreement that the company should not sell over 150 acres to each settler and to charge not over \$2.50 an acre. The government sued and won recovery on these grounds, and the lands were sold in violation of the agreement.

The decision to all intents throws out cross complaints of hundreds of settlers who claimed right to parts of the land involved in the action. The case will be appealed.

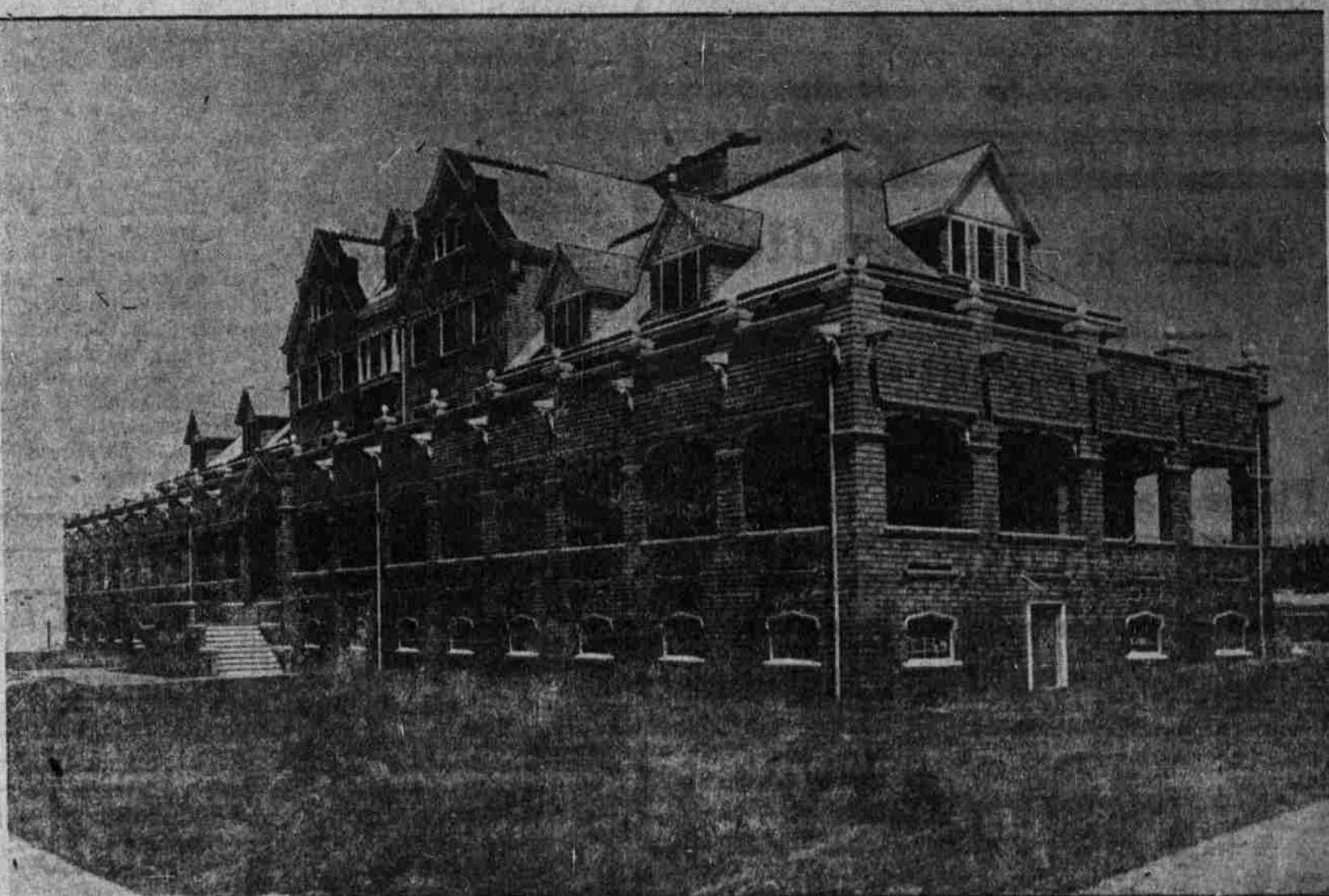
