

FIRE TEAM PLAN ADVANCED

PROPOSITION GIVEN START BY
PURCHASE OF SPRINKLER.

Committee Recommends That Man and
Team Quartered at Station.

Establishment of a near-paid fire department will be realized in this city in short order if recommendations made by the street committee at the council meeting last night are finally adopted, and action will in all probabilities be taken at the next meeting.

The purchase of a street sprinkler brought about the recommendations. In making their recommendations regarding a street sprinkler and team to handle it, the street committee conferred with the fire and police committee with the result that Councilman Mackey, of the fire and police committee, advanced a plan whereby a logical solution of the problem can be reached. In conjunction with the recommendation that the city buy a street sprinkler from the M. & M., the street committee recommended that a man and team be employed by the city—the team to be purchased outright probably—to handle the sprinkler in the summer and do any other work that may be assigned to it, but that the team and man should be quartered at or near the fire department headquarters at night. The team is to be housed at close proximity to the hook and ladder and hose carts, and the driver is to have a room in the department, with telephone facilities near so that a fire alarm can be turned into that point and a team with hose and ladders started toward a night fire with the least possible loss of time.

The street committee recommended these plans in the rough, but the matter of hiring a team or purchasing it was left to the council. The scheme is so popular with business men that there seems little question but that the council will be urged to carry out these recommendations. It would be the first step toward a paid fire department, and the outlay would be very nominal.

The ordinance providing for the purchase of the sprinkler was introduced last evening and when the one sprinkler is inadequate, private wagons will be hired.

TOTAL ECLIPSE.

wholly in the southern waters of the Pacific ocean, extending from southeastern Australia to central America. The only points on land where observations can be made are in the Samoan and Friendly islands, where totality will last nearly five minutes.

The best points for the observation of this strange of all heavenly phenomena are the upraised coral-formed islands known as the Vavau and Torua of the Samoan group. The hills or mountain peaks there rise from 1,500 to 2,000 feet in the air from the placid waters of the Pacific. On these islands eminent groups of scientists sent out by universities and royal societies have set up instruments with long, unpronounceable names for the purpose of taking observations of the eclipse. The Solar Physics observatory, at South Kensington, England, has sent to the island of Vavau an expedition headed by Sir Norman Lockyer. Another notable party of German scientists, headed by Dr. Wegener, has established quarters on the island of Tau in American Samoa.

During the few minutes of total eclipse the scientists hope to obtain photographs which will enable them to define at least two or three of the uncertain chemical elements of the sun. It is known that there are 75 such elements; of these 60 have been

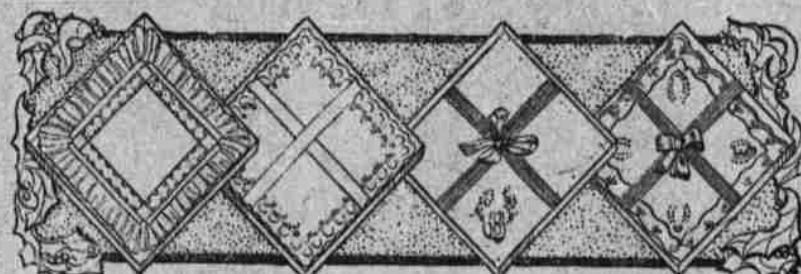

Heretofore it has almost always been found to transport the best instruments to the best and most favorable points of observation, but today more different kinds of strange things are to be pointed at old Sol than ever before in the history of that gentleman. The British expedition took with it three great telescopic cameras in order that photographs might be taken of the corona—the radiant light which during a total solar eclipse surrounds the dark disc. Each telescope is of a different scale in order that varying photographs may be obtained. The expedition has also a six-inch prism camera which contains four prisms, each of which is ten inches square. The prisms, acting between the sun and the lens, split the light into different colors, each color indicating a different element.

STALLION REGISTRATION BOARD
SENDS INSTRUCTIONS.

Dr. P. A. Charlton Now Has Copy of
the Law.

Explicit instructions to stallion owners in Union county has been received by Dr. P. A. Charlton from the state stallion registry board. The new law was passed at the last session of the legislature and summarized, provides for the following steps to be taken by the owners of stallions throughout the state:

Application to E. L. Potter, Corvallis, for filing blanks is the first step. Filing out the blank, stipulating whether the horse is purebred thoroughbred or mongrel—it doesn't matter if the animal is purebred or not, the actual facts in the case must be stipulated over an affidavit—inclosing \$10, and forwarding to the secretary, Mr. Potter, is the next move.

All stallion owners must have a placard over the door to the animal's stall indicating exactly what breed or if mongrel, to so state, in letters not less than one inch high.

The state will order inspection of the stallion after the application blank properly filled out reaches the board. If the inspection is satisfactory, further steps are needless. If the inspector finds the animal unfit, he so reports, and the board appoints one man, the owner of the stallion one and these two name a third man to form a commission to pass finally on the merits of the horse about to be registered with the state board. That board's word is final.

Of course, not to comply with these requirements leads to prosecution.

The complete wording of the law is now in the possession of Mr. Charlton and all stallion owners who desire further information can inquire of Mr. Charlton or write to Mr. Potter. Application blanks can also be secured of Mr. Charlton.

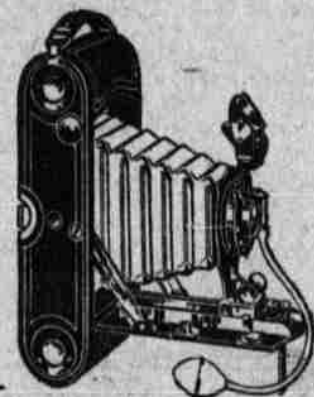
