SHOW STALLS ARE CONSTRUCTED

BIG CREW OF CARPENTERS AT WORK ON BUILDING.

Preparations for Union Stock Show Are Progressing With Vim. Union, May 3.—(Special)—With a crew of 10 carpenters the management of the Union stock show has commenced the completion of 100 stalls for exhibit in the show June 1, 2 and 3rd, and 60,000 feet of lumber will be consumed in the work. The grounds on which the building are erected have been leased for a term of five years and substantial buildings are going up on the site so that all horses entered can be properly housed. The publicity to be given the show will come largely from a horseback ride by a Union delegation over the valley and by neat pamphlets now in course of publication. With the big show less than a month away the association has redoubled its vigor to make the event a banner success as it has always been in the past.

MANY SCHOOL CHILDREN ARE LOSING THEIR SIGHT.

Light Coming in Through Windows Affects Those Seated Near Them.

In a recent physical examination of the school children of River Forest, Ill. it was found that 55 per cent of those in need of medical attention were suffering from defective vision, says W. L. Nida in the Good Housekeeping Magazine. A study of conditions in these schools and many others has disclosed the fact that pupils who are seated at the rows of desks by the windows are subjected to a flood of light rays coming direct from the open sky and striking their faces at such an angle as to cause severe exhaustion. Their eyes are in danger of being permanently injured, not only because of the wrong direction of the light, but also by the undue amount received. These alarming conditions are known to prevail in almost all schoolrooms in the land, and open minded investigators may be convinced of the truth of this by themselves occupying for a few hours seats which the pupils are required to sit in for ten months of the year.

CONFERENCE TO CONTINUE CASES TALK CANNERY TO OCTOBER

BUSINESS MEN TO MEET SPOKANE MAN TONIGHT.

Plans for Placing Home Money in Canning Factory Under Way.

Conference between directors of the Commercial club, business men and John W. Searles of the John W. Searles company of Spokane, relative to the institution of a canning factory in La Grande, has been called by Commercial club Manager S. M. Slough for this afternoon at 5:30 o'clock. At that time the visiting promoter will put his proposition before the club and action can be taken.

The matter may involve the expenditure of about \$10,000 but the issue that interests the Spokane man is the selling of machinery for the plant and the supplying of expert canning men to operate it. Otherwise the proposition is to be a home affair entirely. No bonus is asked and no stock is wanted by Mr. Searles.

It is along these lines that the matter will be discussed this evening. Mr. Searles and Mr. Slough have gone over the proposition informally with orchardmen and business men and the urgent need of a cannery here is felt and admitted by every one.

PARKER APPEAL AMONG THOSE CONTINUED.

Illicit Liquor Sale Cases Also Carried Over to October.

The fate of Jesse Parker convicted of manslaughter last fall, and his case appealed, will not be determined for several months to come.

The May term of the supreme court sitting at Pendleton has carried that case, along with others from La Grande, over to the October term at which time it will be argued and several weeks will be required to gain a decision even then. In the interim Mr. Parker will continue in liberty under bonds.

Other cases to be postponed by the court were the convictions against L. Remillard, Dell Kennedy and the Townsend boys for alleged illicit sale of liquor while Union county was dry. These cases were appealed but enforcement of a previously dormant rule relative to the time of filing briefs forced the cases over until the October term.

Other Cases Argued.

Among the cases argued and presented to the tribunal were the cases of state vs. MacDonald, the escheat case; O. R. & N. vs. Coolidge, a rebate issue; Frank Brown against Truax, relative to a sum of money representing a wood deal at Kamela; Wills vs. Palmer Lumber company and the home rule case, state vs. Schleur.

Decisions in these cases will be forthcoming in due course of time.

New Rule Effective.

Most of the local attorneys who have been attending the term have returned. A rather short session of the court is reported on account of a new interpretation of two old rules of the court having been announced at the opening of court on Monday morning. Under the procedure now in vogue, the court will not listen to argument and allow the filing of any briefs after the argument, but where the briefs of both sides are not in on the opening day, the case must go over for the term, or for a period of six months. All of the cases from this county involving the trials of the cases brought through the employed detective against persons charged with violating the local option law and the validity of the indictments in those cases go over on account of this rule.

A New Sanitary Scheme For Schools.
Dr. C. E. Coulter, president of the board of education of Ogden, Utah, stated that in accordance with the board's determination to give the "sanitary towel" a tryout in the local schools orders have been placed with the manufacturers for a trial consignment, which will be installed at once. These towels are of paper about 12 by 18 inches in size and come in big rolls, which are hung in convenient places about the wash rooms. The individual in using one tears it from the roll by means of the perforations and after drying himself deposits the towel in a metal box provided for the purpose, from which it cannot be withdrawn and used over again by some one else.

The home rule amendment of the constitution, decided by the circuit court in Wallowa county to be inoperative in a county dry throughout, was up for consideration yesterday. The Portland lawyers employed by the Home Rule association claim that the amendment operated to repeal the local option law immediately in all cities where it was then in force and that the words which Judge Knowles held to make the whole amendment subject to the local option law, instead of having that effect, allowed the cities to put it back in operation again, at will. The attorneys were pitted with questions from the bench, it is reported.
