ERRATIC INNING LOSES GAME

SMITH'S BACKERS LOOSE AND WILD IN ONE INNING.

On the Whole Kept La Grande Working Steadily to Win Again.

Bob Smith's proteges lost their heads in the second inning of yesterday's Eastern Oregon league setto on the Lincoln grounds and consequently lost the game, for notwithstanding that the visitors took a hitch in their belts and played first rate ball from that inning they could not prevent a 7 to 3 victory for La Grande—the fifth the pennant chasers have taken in succession since the debut April 23. Almost a record crowd for the year saw the game through to the finish for the Unionites were playing better ball at the finish than at the start. La Grande showed W. Childers over the pan after he walked, got second on Stoddard's sacrifice and third on a wild pitch and scored when Bradley laced on out to third that ordinarily would have been a hit but was knocked down by Allen so as to give the latter an error. Union came back the second inning with a score when Davis connected scoring Sheets. In the second half the thinktank explosion came with terrific effect and in the melee Union allowed four runs. Miles went third on Allen's fumble; M. Childers got first on a fielder's choice; Conley got a clean hit and McInnis went on with a fielder's choice; Wallace Childers followed in the same footsteps and Stoddard was the third man to get on with a fielder's choice. The fun started with Allen trying to outrun Childers from third instead of throwing the ball; Allen let Conley score on a boot. Booths Clark booted and let McInnis score and shortly after let Childers score. When the erratic playing ended it was a good game throughout. La Grande pulled off a bonehead play or two and made a few errors but just the same gave the crowd its money's worth with hard pitching and good fielding. The Union fielders messed up so many bingles that it looks like Smith was almost invincible for the visitors are peppery enough to get in the way of a hit but couldn't complete the play after knocking the ball down. The result was few hits and lots of errors.

Stoddard Injured.

In the fifth inning Stoddard was quite severely injured in trying to stretch a clean single to a two-bagger. He collided with Sheets at second and sprained his ankle very badly, and will be out of the game for some time. It is feared. "Sticks" Woods, son of Joe Woods, a former liveryman of this city, and who has recently returned from school, was put on the initial sack and surely made good with the fans. He is a left hander and had to use a right handed man's glove but has a peculiar twist in receiving that pleased the fans immensely. The players got to teasing him with over-throwing for the fun of seeing him retrieve from the upper air currents. Though he got but one chance at the bat, the profuse glad hand the grand stand gave him rattled him and he fanned. He has blossomed into a very fair first baseman while out of town.

L. B. Tuttle of Elgin was on the mound for the indicator job and to his credit he said that none could have done better—this, too, in the face of critical "bugs." His work was highly satisfactory.

The audience yesterday numbered 633. There is one thing about Bob Smith. You can't ruffle his nerves. He threw a steady, unsensational but effective game.

For the visitors, he it said, there are several good clouters in their midst.
