ALBANY'S PLANS ADVANCED

TOWN SMALLER THAN LA GRANDE EXPENDS LARGE SUMS.

Big Amphitheatre Will Be Constructed for Summer Lectures

Albany, Oregon, but little smaller than La Grande, is making preparations for the building of a chautauqua theatre that will seat 3,000 people. The Albany people are behind their chautauqua for July with plenty of money, according to news dispatches from there. Among the latest developments in the Albany plans, are the following as outlined in a press dispatch:

It was decided to begin work at once on the auditorium in the chautauqua grounds in Bryant's park, and a building committee consisting of J. S. Van Winkle, L. E. Hamilton and A. C. Schmitz was named to direct the work. This auditorium will be built in a natural amphitheatre which can be fitted for the purpose with very little grading and will have a seating capacity for 3,000.

Reports at last evening's meeting show that more than enough funds to finance this year's assembly have been obtained, and with a good program almost completed plans are progressing satisfactorily for one of the most successful chautauqua assemblies ever held in the state. Outside talent which will present the afternoon and evening programs has been secured and prominent speakers and educators of the northwest to appear in the forum hours on the various days will complete the program.

SHEARING PLANT AT COVE IS A BUSY PLACE TODAY.

Yearling Clips Average About Nine Pounds of Wool.
