WORLD-PEACE MEET.

Mohonk Lake, N. Y., May 24.—Three subjects of live interest and importance are slated for discussion at the 17th annual meeting of the Lake Mohonk conference on international arbitration, which began a three days' session here today with President Nicholas Murray Butler of Columbia university presiding.

The pending treaty of arbitration between the United States and Great Britain, the proposed celebration of the centenary of the treaty of Ghent, and the existing condition of affairs now in Mexico are the subjects that will receive attention in addresses and papers to be presented by statesmen, diplomats and other men of prominence.

On the subject of the Anglo-American treaty John W. Foster, former secretary of state, will lead the discussion for the United States and Rosal Danard of the Canadian senate and Henri bouyassa, a Montreal editor, for Canada. Senator Burton of Ohio will report on the celebration of a century of peace among English speaking peoples, and among the distinguished Canadians to hear him will be Chief Justice Sir William Mulock of the high court of justice for Ontario, Associate Justices J. J. McClaren and W. R. Riddell of the same court, and W. L. McKenzie King, Canadian minister

of labor.

Other men of wide prominence participating in the conference include Charlemagne Tower, former ambassador to Russia and Austria; Oscar S. Strauss, member of The Hague court; Charles P. Neill, United States commissioner of labor; Braon d'Estournelles de Constant, member of the French senate; James Brown Scott, secretary of the Carnegie Peace Endowment, and Congressman Richard Bartholdt of Missouri.
