The funeral will be held from the family home at 1417 Washington Friday afternoon, and all friends who wish may view the remains. Doctor Seemann will officiate.

A MARATHON RUNAWAY

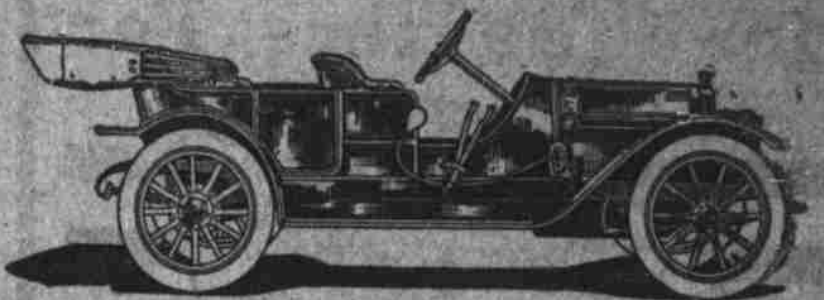
COVE TEAM RUNS 22 MILES WITHOUT INJURIES.

Barriers of Many Varieties Do Not Stop Their Progress.

A remarkable runaway occurred at Cove Sunday, remarkable for the endurance of the horses and for the lack of fatality as the team ran through three towns, along much travelled roads and through several doorways.

The team was the property of Geo. Shadwick of Lower Cove. Attached to a hack it ran from Lower Cove through Cove, through Union, to and through Telocaset and was finally halted on the Hyatt farm near Telocaset. In front of the Shadwick home a lady was just mounting the step of the hack when the team took fright and started. She was thrown but fortunately was not dragged. Through the farmers system of telephone lines the team was followed as a train dispatcher follows his trains. Notified that the team was coming several barricades were erected across the roadway to stop the horses. They dashed right over these. Nor could they be frightened into stopping by men with clubs.

On the long up grade above Union a determined effort was made to stay their progress. But the team climbed a high bank, to run around a heavy wagon, and to avoid two men who went ahead of their own team to intercept them.

A gang plow, with the three shares set in the ground, finally stayed the progress of the runaways. Separating the horses went on either side of the plow. The front axle of the hack caught and threw the horses, then about exhausted. The horses were loping when they struck the plow.

The horses are reported stiffened up but still able to travel.
