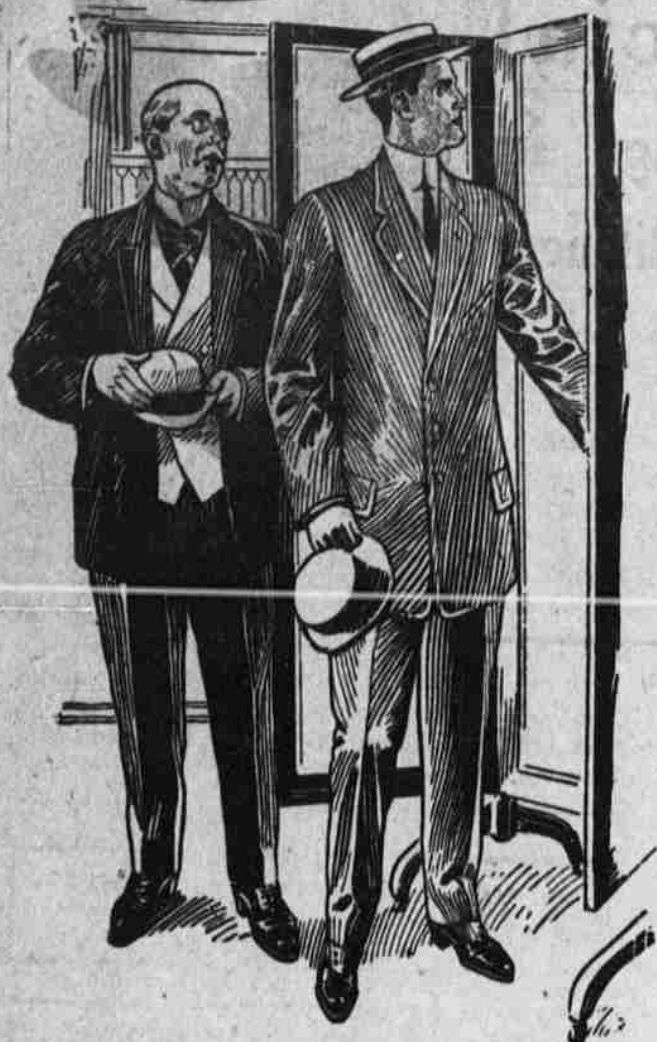

Sale of Timber.

Portland, Oregon, April 24, 1911. Sealed bids, marked outside, "Bid. Timber Sale Application, December 22, 1910, Whitman," and addressed to the District Forester, Forest Service, Portland, Oregon, will be received up to and including the 28th day of June, 1911, for all the merchantable dead timber, standing or down, and all the live timber marked for cutting by the forest officer, located on an area to be definitely designated by the Forest officer before cutting begins, including about 11,500 acres on the watershed of Squaw Creek, comprising the E1-2 of Sec. 1 and part of the N 1-2 of Sec. 12, T. 12 S., R. 35 E., approximately all of S. 33, part of Secs. 23 and 34 of unsurveyed T. 11 S., R. 35 1-2 E., and approximately all of Secs. 4, 9, 10 11, 14, 15 and 16, and parts of Secs. 1, 2, 3, 12, 13, 21, 22, 23, 25 and 26 of unsurveyed T. 12 S., R. 35 1-2 E., W. M., which area shall be known as Compartment I; and comprising approximately all of Sec. 35, and parts of Secs. 22, 23, 25, 26, 27, 34 and 36 in unsurveyed T. 12 S., R. 35 1-2 E., and parts of Secs. 1, 2 and 3 of unsurveyed T. 13 S., R. 35 1-2 E., W. M., which area shall be known as Compartment II; estimated to be on Comp. I, 56,625,000 feet B. M. of live and merchantable dead western yellow pine, 7,983,300 feet B. M. of live and merchantable dead western larch, 4,769,700 feet B. M. of live and merchantable dead Douglas fir, 296,100 feet B. M. of live white fir, and 45,000 feet B. M. of live lodgepole pine, and on Comp. II, 3,553,500 feet B. M. of live and merchantable dead western yellow pine, 312,800 feet B. M. of live western larch, 130,300 feet B. M. of live Douglas fir, 32,200 feet B. M. of live white fir, and 5,000 feet B. M. of live lodgepole pine, sawtimber, log scale, more or less. No bid of less than \$2.25 per thousand feet B.
