forced them to forfeit the option. That made them sore. In 1900 Morgan organized the National Tube company and made money. He was also heavily interested in railroads. Carnegie intimated he proposed to build a tube plant at Ashtabula, Ohio and a railroad rounding up his various plants to relieve him of the necessity of paying freight to outside roads. Nervous at this, Morgan asked Jim Hill to find a way to prevent Carnegie's plan. Hill

arranged an interview between me and Morgan. I told them to get Schwab and later I came to New York with a tentative plan for consolidation of the steel industry which evolved into a holding company scheme. This was the birth of the steel trust.
