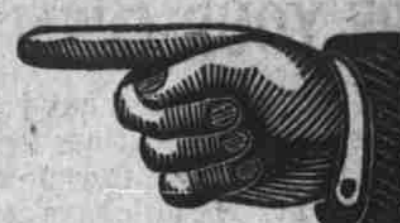

PAVING ISSUE IS MEMORIAL SAID ARGUED TO SOLDIERS

CITY'S DEMURRER TO SUIT IS ARGUED TODAY.

White Suit Has Been Assuming Shape—Paving Has Been Done.

Litigation instituted by Fred B. Halsten against the city of La Grande and the Warren Construction company to stop pavement of Sixth street came to the first clash this afternoon when the demurrer filed to the suit was argued before Circuit Judge Knowles. Mr. Halsten, through his attorney, J. D. Slater, commenced suit about the time the Warren people started to lay the paving on Sixth. City Attorney Cochran appeared with a demurrer and it was this action that was argued today. If the city wins in this instance it will end the litigation, for the present at least, and if Halsten wins, it will mean further process looking toward a complete string of points held up as reasons why the paving should not be done. As the paving has been completed, practically, the matter of payment is now directly involved.

FANS SEE BIG PITCHERS

Big bush leaguers were seen at Pendleton yesterday when Walla Walla and Pendleton went 13 innings, the former winning 8-6. "Mysterious" Mitchell threw a portion of the game for Walla Walla but was wiggled by the umpire for quarrelling. Pendleton had a twirler who goes to San Francisco next week to join the Coast leaguers there. Splendid hitting and fielding made the game exceptionally interesting, according to Messrs. SELF CONQUERING THEME OF MEMORIAL SERMON.

Old Tunes and Patriotic Speech Please Old Veterans Yesterday.

Now that the war is over it is the duty of individuals to conquer themselves, rather than the other fellow, was the salient thought of the Memorial Sunday address delivered by Dr. J. D. Gillilan yesterday afternoon at the Christian church at which old soldiers were the majority audience. Old tunes and congregational singing abetted by the address made up the program.

The lecture was along the lines of self-conquering and another point dwelt upon was the fact that while historians have written profusely on the war itself, during the past, the results of that war are subjects for themes by the writers of today and tomorrow.

There was a lack of formality, surplanted with earnest, patriotic talk and singing at the services, and it pleased and satisfied the soldiers.

PAROLE OF NINE MONTHS' DURATION GIVEN.

Condition Is That Mr. Berry Refrain From Use of Intoxicants.

W. W. Berry was today paroled by Judge Knowles and if he abides by instructions and conditions on which he gained his conditioned freedom will not have to serve the balance of his year's term in the county jail. He has served three months, approximately, and in that time has been a diligent servant of the county. He has been

working on the county roads and bridges and made so earnest effort to please the officials that clemency was solicited and obtained. A petition signed by nearly every business man in town and many citizens in general was presented to Judge Knowles this morning.

The conditions of the parole are that Mr. Berry refrain from the use of intoxicating liquors and in other ways live an exemplary life.
