Circuit court for the June term commences next Monday and already many cases have been disposed of from the equity docket. At motion day yesterday the following cases were considered:

L. A. Reick vs. George Palmer Lumber company, settled and dismissed.

M. C. Metz, George A. Hamilton and son; dismissed for want of prosecution's plaintiff.

J. E. Hall vs. Jerome LaSelle; settled and dismissed.

First National bank of Elgin vs. J. E. Bass, settled and dismissed.

C. H. Jordan vs. A. Ferguson, settled and dismissed.

Lee Wisdom vs. Anna Wisdom, dismissed without prejudice.

Helen Alkine vs. Elizabeth Taylor et al; settled and dismissed.

Elizabeth Taylor vs. J. P. Scott, dismissed without prejudice.

Wright Mercantile company vs. C. H. Law, dismissed without prejudice.

Jackson vs. S. O. Correy, judgment for plaintiff.

SENSE OF DANGER.

Developed to a Marked Degree in Men Who Work in Mines.

There is something about mines that appeals to the superstitious of mankind, writes T. Lane Carter in the Mining and Scientific Press. One of the most marked effects he has noticed in men who have spent most of their life in mining is a sense of danger that suddenly comes over them.

"Some would call this faculty the sixth sense," he writes. "If you asked a miner how he knows there is something wrong he will reply that he feels it. I had a remarkable illustration of this a few years ago.

"I was walking along a main drift with a mine captain, a man who had been working in mines for over forty years, having started as a lad in the mines of Cornwall. Suddenly he stopped and exclaimed that something was wrong.

"For the life of me I could not see a thing amiss. The timbers seemed solid, and the drive pillars looked secure. But the captain was not satisfied and insisted on climbing into the stope to investigate. There he found a large crack, running for hundreds of feet, indicating a movement of the strata of serious proportions.

"Had this discovery not been made in time there would have been a serious accident in the mine, with a probable loss of life. I dare say the years of experience in the mine had developed a power in him which the men called superstition, but which was really the faculty of accurate observation, which to him seemed unconscious."

JUSTICES POINT OUT REASONS

JOSEPH DECISION EXPLAINED BY THE JUSTICES.

Reasons for Affirming Judge Knowles Explained From Salem.

Further information on the stand taken by members of the supreme court in affirming the decision of Judge Knowles in the Joseph home rule litigation is contained in news dispatches from Salem.

According to the supreme court, Burnett concurring in a municipal government can change its charter so as to violate the constitution or criminal laws of Oregon, and since

all felonies and general misdemeanors are necessarily comprehended in the phrase, "criminal laws," the home-rule law enacted by the people in fringes upon the constitution for the reason that it is a misdemeanor in this state to violate the local-option law. In the case at hand, the appellant requested the court to direct a verdict of not guilty on the ground that the local-option law was not in force in the city of Joseph by reason of the amendment ratified November 8, 1910, at the general election, which amendment is construed to mean the home-

rule amendment. Justice Moore holds that the word "exclusive" contained in the home-rule amendment, which tends to give cities the sole right to regulate the liquor traffic, is not entitled to the force and importance usually given it, and as the restriction contains no exception, he is of the opinion that the employment of exclusive power conferred by the home-rule law is subject to all consequences that may have resulted from an adoption of the local-option law, so that an order of prohibition, made in a county as a whole, cannot be modified or vacated except by the subsequent vote of the qualified electors of the incorporated city or town, cast against prohibition, at an election regularly called for that purpose in the municipality, and, no election of that kind having been held in the city of Joseph, the license issued to the appellant is invalid and the holder subject to the local-option law, irrespective of whether or not a license was granted under the proposed protection of the home-rule amendment.

Justice Burnett concurs with Justice Moore, but not with the same reasoning. He holds that the phrase "exclusive power" contained in the home rule amendment means nothing more than has already been vested in every incorporated city or town, nor do the words "within the limits" change the conditions in existence before the revision of 1910. Justice Burnett writes:

"They only serve to intensify what has already been said in general terms that the city boundaries present no obstacle to the supremacy of the criminal laws of the state over any internal regulation of the municipality. Where else than 'within its limits' could a city be subject to either constitution or any criminal law of state? The logic of appellant's contention is that the words 'exclusive power' are to be construed in their unrestricted sense. At the last he maintains that the effect of the amendment is to repeal the local option law so as to exclude rural voters of the county from all elections which otherwise would affect the liquor traffic in the city. With this as his major premise established on the day of election, the minor premise, the wet vote in Joseph, was made good at the same time, and his exemption from prosecution ought to follow as a conclusion with the certainty of a syllogism."

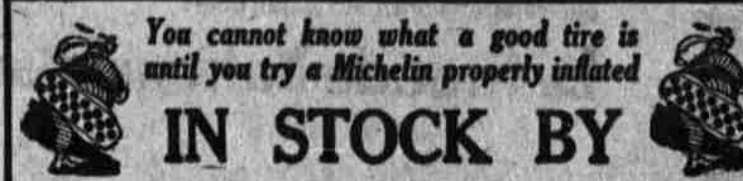
