MAN FALLS; UNHURT.

Workman Tumbles 50 Feet From Baker Church; Not Injured.

Baker, June 2.—(Special)—Falling from a height of 50 feet Jesse Powers, employed in rigging up the flag pole over the L. D. S. church in South Baker escaped almost miraculously with nothing more than a severe shaking up and external bruises, according to the attending physician, Dr. O. M. Dodson.

Powers, who came here recently from Wyoming, was rigging up the pole preparatory to Memorial day observances when his belt broke, and the man's own weight carried him down in his perilous fall. He was badly stunned and was taken to St. Elizabeth's hospital. The injured man had just recently left a hospital in Wyoming and his wife is now in a hospital in Portland.

While hurrying preparations for starting the ambulance to take Powers to the hospital, Robert Beltman slipped and badly twisted his leg.

Notice of Street Improvement.

To whom it may concern: Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon on the 15th day of December, 1909, creating improvement district No. 13 and designating North Fir street, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 3rd day of May, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of North Fir street in said improvement district as hereinafter described, by laying thereon macadam roadway, the council will, ten days after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefitted by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of North Fir street, from the south curb line of Monroe avenue, to the south line of Z avenue.

(A) And the property affected or benefitted by said improvement is as follows:

All the east halves of blocks 7, 6, 5, 4, 3 and 2, Predmore addition block 1, Predmore block and east halves of blocks 155, 150 and N. E. 1-4 of block 155, Chaplin's addition and the west halves of blocks 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23 and 24, Predmore addition and the west half of 154, 151 and 143, Chaplin's addition and N. W. 1-4 of block 124, Chaplin's addition, all in the city of La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected and benefitted by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of such improvement is the sum of \$14,750.00. That the council will, on the 17th day of June, 1911, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock p. m. to consider said assessment, and the levy of said assessment, when a hearing will be given to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
