ALL ABOARD FOR BAKER SUNDAY

FINAL PLANS LAID AND TRAIN IS PROVIDED.

Team and Fans Will Leave La Grande at 8:30 A. M., Sunday.

After several days of indecision in the matter, it has been at last definitely decided to run an excursion to Baker next Sunday morning, and the train will leave La Grande at 8:30 o'clock, returning leaving Baker at 6:30 the same day. This will give the fans nearly all day in Baker and will also give the baseball fans an opportunity to return home before a very late hour at night.

The round trip fare will be \$2.10. As it is necessary that 80 passengers go to make good the guarantee, the baseball team is out drumming up added interest.

New Man in Team.

A clever infielder has been brought to La Grande as a permanent replacement of this place and he will be in the lineup Sunday. He will be a short and with Bradley, Wallace Childers, and Kall or Woods as the infield, there should be little opportunity for anything to get away from

the pennant chasers. The new man is Alex McDonald, and he comes with a fine record as a fielder.

With the team thus strengthened up the squad will go to Baker determined to win the important game there. Interest at Baker is unusually keen.

To Honor Naming of America.

Paris, June 2.—Nearly all the leaders of the American colony in Paris, including Ambassador Bacon and Consul-General Mason, are going to the little city of St. Die, in the Vosges, to take part in the celebration of the 100th anniversary of the publication of the "Cosmographie Introductio," in which the western continent was first termed America. The celebration, which is to take the form of a Franco-American love feast, is to open tomorrow and continue over Sunday and Monday. The program will include a military review, a historical pageant, and the installation of a tablet on the house where the name America was first written. The corner stone also is to be laid of an obelisk, to be known as America's Tower, on the peak of Mount Ormont, in the Vosges forest.

Forest Fires Commence.

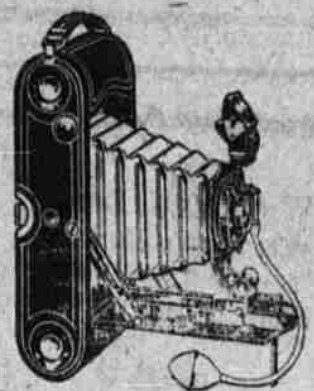
Vancouver, June 2.—The forest fire season commenced in the district of Columbia with a big fire at Arrowhead, 150 miles north of Nelson. Over a mile wide, the fire is raging, advancing rapidly despite the efforts of a half hundred firefighters sent out from Arrowhead.

Unless the wind changes Arrowhead will not burn. No loss of life is reported so far. The district is heavily timbered. Assistance has been summoned from Revelstoke and the surrounding towns.

Pope Celebrated Birthday.

Rome, June 2.—Pope Pius X. reached his 76th birthday anniversary today. Owing to the fact that he has not fully recovered from his recent illness there was no celebration of the day. During the morning, however, many of the cardinals, vatican officials and other Italian and foreign churchmen and laymen left their cards and many addresses and telegrams of congratulation were received by his holiness from all parts of the world.
