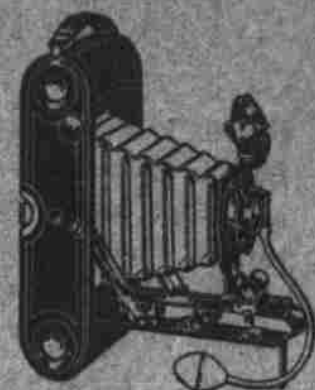
Racing Was First Class.

He was holding relay horses and when the first half mile was finished he was standing on the track in a position where he caught the full force of a running horse just before it went under the wire. He was knocked to the ground and badly bruised remaining unconscious for several minutes. Pat Foley was summoned with his automobile and conveyed the injured man to his home.
