Attorney Acted as Go-Between for Crooks in Robbery.

New York, June 6.—Daniel O'Reilly, one of Harry Thaw's attorneys at his trial for killing White, will probably be taken to Blackwell's Island today to begin serving a five month's term for receiving stolen property.

O'Reilly was convicted in connection with the robbery of Aaron Bancroft, a broker, of \$8,700 in securities as the latter was entering the stock exchange to deposit them. The envelope in which Bancroft was carrying the securities was on the pretense of an accident knocked to the floor of the bank. As it fell it was picked up by a crook who before returning it to Bancroft, substituted an envelope filled with old papers.

O'Reilly acted as a go-between for the crooks who held the securities for a reward.

HARMONY MASS MEETING.

May Be Held Soon to Get Republicans Together.

Springfield, Ill., June 6.—A harmony mass meeting at which the stand patters and progressive leaders of the republican party in Illinois will attempt to settle differences and prepare a new protection of the republican principals will probably be held soon.

gestion of President Taft during his visit here. The meeting is said to be the first of many planned in different states to get republicans solidly lined up for the coming presidential campaign.

Assist Needy Neighbor.

Portland, Ore., June 6.—An instance of neighborhood co-operation that is worth noting was that of people living near Heppner recently. W. W. Dranner, a big farmer, was compelled to neglect his work because of sickness in the family and his neighbors gathered at his ranch with 16 outfits and 93 head of horses and in one day broke 35 acres and seeded 100 additional acres. They finished the entire job before night.

Astoria Invites Taft.

Washington, June 6.—President Taft today received an invitation to visit Astoria, Oregon, during the centennial celebration in August. The president has not yet decided as to whether or not he will accept. He is also considering an invitation to visit Washington on the invitation of Governor Hay.

Progressive Elected in Iowa.
Council Bluffs, Iowa, June 6.—Complete returns of the special congressional election here today show that Judge Green, progressive republican candidate, was elected over W. F. Cleveland, democratic candidate, by a plurality of 1,192. Only 60 per cent of the total registration voted.

Not to Press Investigation.
Washington, June 6.—Democratic house leaders today decided not to

press investigation of the wool trust until the Underwood wool revision amendment to the tariff passes. It is not expected that the Underwood measure will pass for possible two weeks as much opposition by the republicans is expected.

Taft in Baltimore.
Baltimore, Md., June 6.—President Taft arrived here this afternoon and Colonel Roosevelt arrived about two hours earlier. A special detachment of police are detailed to guard them.
