JAPANESE FIGHT CHILD LABOR

Under Law Child Under 12 Years Can-
not be Employed.

Washington, June 9.—The Japanese
have followed the lead of the United
States in legislation to insure the aboli-
tion of child labor, the safety of the
employees, and sanitary conditions in
factories, according to information re-
ceived at the department of state.

Under the new laws persons under
12 years of age may not be employed
in any factory. Persons under 15
years of age and women may not be
employed more than 12 hours a day,
nor for the oiling or repairing of dan-
gerous machinery. All shall have at
least two holidays a month. Persons
under 15 shall not be employed in the
handling of poisons, injurious chemi-
cals, or explosives.

All persons working more than six
hours a day shall have a recess during
working hours of at least 30 minutes
and if working more than 10 hours
the recess shall be at least one hour.
Persons working alternately in day
and night shifts shall have at least
four holidays a month, and the work-
ing hours shall be alternated at least
once every ten days.

To Spray Canal With Concrete.

Washington, June 9.—Arrangements
have been made by the Canal com-
mission for the testing on the Pana-
ma Canal of a pneumatic spraying
machine for coating rock surfaces
with concrete mortar. Much of the
rock in Culebra cut deteriorates af-
ter being exposed to the atmosphere.
To prevent the crumbling of the sides
of the cut it is proposed to cover the
rock with a concrete mixture. The
machine will be tested for a period of
30 days, and, if found satisfactory, will
be purchased by the commission.
