## FRONTIERSMEN TO GATHER

CELEBRATION OF 100TH ANNIVERSARY OF DISCOVERY.

Veterans of Early Days Will Meet at Kettle Falls Next Week.

Spokane, Wash., June 12.—When veteran frontiersmen and early settlers in the Pacific slope country for-gather in the town of Kettle Falls, Wash., of Friday, June 23, to celebrate the 100th anniversary of the discovery of the Kettle Falls on the Columbia river, 95 miles north of here, they will pay tribute to the memory of David Thompson, a trail-blazer for the Hudson's Bay Company, which established its first trading post on what now is American territory, in 1812.

The celebration will be under the immediate direction of the Kettle Falls Pioneer association, headed by A. W. Smith. George H. Beven vice president of the Stevens County Pioneer association, has been selected to deliver the address of welcome, other speakers being Colonel J. M. Fish, Dr. B. L. Brigham, W. J. Stambaugh and Thomas Ledgerwood. The latter clearly recalls the period when there was only one settler along the Columbia river between Fort Colville and Fort Spokane, the latter now designated as Miles in the Postal guide. In addition to the exercises there will be the annual reunion of the early settlers of Stevens county and a centennial dinner. The town of Kettle Falls, which he host, was founded in the winter of 1890-1, but was settled more than 40 years ago.

There is an interesting Indian legend of the Kettle falls and the origin of its name, probably handed down from the Flathead tribesmen, who referred to them as Ilth-coy-ope, on account of the numerous kettles in the rocks. The tradition is that a pebble was rushed along the current of the Columbia and found lodgment in a crack of the rock, and whirled in its new bed, it ground a bit off the oxeye. Other pebbles came down the stream and bit into the same stone and in the ages that passed the large potlike excavations were worn in the rock. At the bottom of these cavities today are pebbles, grinding deeper into the ledge, athwart which swirl the waters of a thousand lakes and mountain streams on their way to the Pacific ocean, more than 600 miles distant.

ENTRIES FROM ALL OVER THE WORLD.

Military Competition for Gold Cup Will Be Keen.

London, June 12.—The fifth international horse show opened at Olympia this afternoon. It will continue through twelve days. Given as it is under the patronage of King George, the exhibition this year has been anticipated with peculiar interest by society and horsemen as one of the most brilliant events of the coronation seasons. Thousands attended the opening day to see the most wonderful, decorated hall, which has been made to represent a Tudor village.

The entries from abroad are more numerous than ever before. For the first time Russia, Germany, Austria and Sweden have sent representatives for the officers' competitions. The other competitors include France, Belgium, the United States and Canada. The military competitions for the King Edward VII. gold cup are expected to be very keen.

Judge Moore again heads the list of American exhibitors in number and variety of entries, his exhibits appearing in almost every class. Other American exhibitors are Alfred G. Vanderbilt, Thomas W. Lawson, Paul Sorg, E. T. Stotebury, J. W. Harriman, C. W. Watson and E. H. Weatherbee.

The judges for the United States and Canada are the Hon. Adam Beck, harness horses and ponies; Alfred G. Vanderbilt, costers; Alfred D. MacLay, saddle horses; Algernon Craen, hunters and Robert A. Fairbairn, trotters and pacers.

### Echo of the Warriner Case.

Cincinnati, O., June 12.—An echo of the famous Warriner case, in which Charles L. Warriner, treasurer of the Four allroad, was sent to prison about a year ago for the embezzlement of \$643,000 of the company's funds, was heard in court here today when the case of Edgar Street Cooke of Chicago was called for trial. Following the disclosures of the Warriner embezzlement a similar charge of embezzlement was brought against Cooke, who was formerly a Big Four employe under Warriner. Warriner is to be brought from the penitentiary at Columbus to testify at the trial of Cooke, and it also expected that Mrs. Hannelte S. Ford, the "woman in the case" will be placed on the stand.
