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TOBACCO CHEFS.

Experts That Make Sauces For Flavoring the Different Brands.

"I am a tobacco chef," said the tall, low man. "I make the sauces that give us smoking or chewing tobacco as a food chef makes the sauces which give us sole Colbert or poulet creole."

"Take this dark, sweet, juicy plug of 'mavy brown,' so popular among the more prosperous type of teamsters. Well, the flavor of this plug is due to a sauce made of sugar, licorice, whisky and honey."

"Here is a mild, cool pipe tobacco that college boys favor. Smell it. Very aromatic, eh? Well, it has been steeped in a sauce composed of the essential oils of citronella, bergamot and cassia."

"But it is when you come to the high grade Havana cigar, the cigar that sells for 40 or 50 cents, that you see the tobacco chef at his best. He doesn't make his sauces then of such common ingredients as sugar, bergamot, licorice and so forth. No, he makes them of bacteria. The flavors of the high grade Havana tobaccos depend, you see, entirely on their ferments. Each tobacco undergoes a different fermentation, and here the chef comes in, applying the bacteria of years which cause these fermentations to the leaf."

"Yes, the tobacco chef of the highest type, the one who ferments Havana tobacco, handles the various breeds of bacteria as an ordinary chef handles pepper and salt, mustard and cloves and mace."—Buffalo Express.

A Glimpse of Bismarck.

Lord Goschen was once asked to dinner by the German chancellor and described the occasion in his memoirs: "Bismarck made an excellent dinner, but not so good as I expected. The fish course consisted of lampreys, and Bismarck said that he had once, to his shame, eaten eighty-one at a sitting. Lord Odo, remembering the fate of a British king, asked if he had no reason to regret the feat. 'Yes,' he said, 'I did regret it. I have often regretted what I have eaten, but never what I have drunk.' But have you not been the worse for it? 'I did not say I had not been the worse for my potatoes. I said I had never regretted them.' He spoke in slow but good English and said a number of quaint and good things. Here is a very characteristic specimen: 'I rather envy you English statesmen the excitement of the house of commons. You have the pleasure of being able to call a man a damned infernal scoundrel. Now, I can't do that in diplomacy.'"

When Parasols Began.

Parasols when they first came into use must have been cumbersome. Henri Estienne, writing in 1578, speaks of a parasol as capable generally of sheltering four persons from the sun. And when they diminished in circumference the material still remained of the heaviest. Red velvet parasols, with heavy gold fringes, were carried by ladies of fashion in the days of Louis XIV. At that time it was possible when crossing a bridge in Paris to hire a parasol at one end and deposit it at the other, the charge for the accommodation being a son. Under the regency fashion went to the other extreme. Men's parasols folded into the shape of a three cornered hat and could thus be carried elegantly under the arm. Ladies' parasols were hinged, so that they could slip into the pocket, for ladies had pockets then.—London Spectator.

SEVERE STORMS IN UMATILLA COUNTY

ONE MAN KILLED AND MUCH DAMAGE DONE.

Grain Knocked Down and Total Result of Storm Is Extensive.

In the worst electrical storm which has visited this country since the year of the Heppner flood, one man was killed last night, considerable grain was beaten down and more or less damage done to stock and buildings by accompanying cloudbursts, says the Pendleton East Oregonian.

Henry Picard, a French-Indian, aged 51 years, in the victim of the lightning, a bolt striking within two feet of his head and killing him instantly. His son, Henry Picard, Jr., was sleeping beside him at the time, but miraculously escaped with only a burned neck. Mr. Picard and his son were spending the warm night in a tent a short distance from the house on the reservation one-half mile south of the agency on the Umatilla reservation, owned by Violet Bourner. At 10:20 a bolt of lightning struck a small iron rod in a wagon tongue which had been set in the ground for use as a tent pole, shattering the wood into a thousand fragments and scattering them for a distance of 50 yards. The back end of the tent was torn out and the shock instantly killed the elder Picard besides burning his body badly. The son, who was sleeping at his father's side, was stunned for some time and, upon recovering consciousness, discovered his father was dead.

Charles Felton was notified by an investigation, decided an inquest was unnecessary. He brought back with him a bundle of the fragments of the wagon tongue. The deceased leaves besides his son, a wife and daughter, Pearl, who were asleep in the house during the storm.

Grain Beaten Down.

Reports have been coming in all day from various parts of the county to the effect that considerable grain was beaten down by the heavy rain that accompanied the electrical storm but the damage is not considered very heavy and most of the stalks will rise again. The heavy stands on the reservation were not affected, but in the foothills and in the Myrick section a considerable acreage was beaten flat.

Several Cloudbursts.

A number of small cloudbursts are reported from different parts of the county but aside from the washing of summer fallow, the drowning of chickens and small stock and the destruction of a few corrals, the damage was small.
