## BAPTISTS HOLD MEETING.

**Plan on Foot to Make Enterprise the Center of Association.**

(Enterprise Chieftain.)

The Grande Ronde Baptist association met in the Baptist church here Thursday afternoon of last week and continued with three sessions a day till Sunday evening. The meetings were full of interest and the attendance was large from the start, crowding the large audience room at the Sunday sessions.

There were nearly 40 delegates and visitors from outside in attendance, 10 of them coming from the two churches at Baker.

The following clergymen were here: D. G. Dunkin, C. H. Eymann, and E. P. Walz of Baker; J. J. Davy from Elgin; L. W. Gowen from La Grande and H. B. Foskett of McMinnville. The Halmes and La Grande churches are just calling pastors. Some of the churches like Burns and Ontario are so far distant that no delegates came. All were represented by message and letter.

Much interest was aroused by the action of the association in which it heartily endorsed the plan to make the Enterprise church a center of all the Baptist work in Wallowa county, endeavoring to have all the Baptists of the county unite with the local church and have a resident pastor who should do missionary work all over the county. The association voted to raise \$500 towards the indebtedness of the local church, and \$150 of that sum was pledged by two individuals.

## THUGS KILL CONDUCTOR.

**Pocatello Trainmen Killed and Another Fatally Injured in Tussle.**

Salt Lake, June 17.—Conductor William Kidd, of the Pocatello division of the Oregon Short Line, was killed, and Deputy Sheriff Jones of Idaho fatally wounded in a fight with two bandits they had arrested at Highbridge, Idaho, today. Jones had taken two revolvers from the desperadoes when one of them got hold of the gun and shot. They then signalled the train to stop and escaped. A posse is pursuing.

## LEAGUE HOLDS CONVENTIONS.

**Important Sessions Held at Union Recently Show Development.**

At the Epworth league convention which closed this week at Union there were 17 leagues represented, leaving but three towns, Wallowa, Prairie City and Enterprise, which did not send a representative. A total of 83 people, including 55 delegates and 28 visitors, were entertained by the Union chapter.

The final report shows that there are 125 associates and 489 active or a total of 621 league members in the La Grande district. The local chapters have held 708 devotional, 147 social and 83 business meetings during the year, having paid out \$570.30 for missions, churches, needy, etc. District and cabinet officers were elected and installed as follows:

John Rudd, Ontario, president; W. S. Miller, Flora, 1st vice president; Nellie Johnson, John Day, 2nd vice president; Mrs. H. C. Vinacke, La Grande, 3rd vice president; Mrs. C. M. Playie, Alice, 4th vice president; Letitia Thompson, Union, recording secretary; Althea Lee, Baker, corresponding secretary; F. L. Lockwood, Nyssa, treasurer; Ada Lay, Joseph, Junior League superintendent, Miss Hattie McMurray, of La Grande, and Wm. Johnson, of Ontario, were elected general delegates to the general conference district convention.

The second department presented a resolution that the La Grande district would support a native bible woman in China at a cost of \$30 a year, which was carried.

There will be two sub-district conventions held this year, one at Nyssa, Sept. 14-15 and the other at Elgin, on Sept. 21-22. They are to be held for the purpose of laying plans for the winter work.
