BAD ROAD NOTES TO BE KEPT

M. K. HALL, PRESIDENT OF UNION COUNTY MOTORISTS.
Already Improvement of Bad Roads Is Taken Up by Club.

With the Union County Motor club only a week old, various patches of bad roads throughout Union county will be remedied as a result of the club's short existence following a meeting last evening of the directors chosen at Hot Lake a week ago. Pieces of bad road, which automobiles have found, will be reported to the county court and the policy of the court insures the patches being repaired at once when attention is called to it. In accordance with this policy the directors will ask all auto owners to carry a "bad road" card and on tours to jot down the location of any bad piece of road or defective bridge, and turn these in to the secretary who will take the matter up with the county court.

Permanent officers elected last evening were Dr. M. K. Hall, president of the Motor club, Fred H. Kiddle, vice president, A. V. Andrews secretary and C. C. Penington treasurer.

The next regular monthly meeting will be the first Monday in the month. Last evening many important matters came up, among them the state tax proposition. The secretary was instructed to work in co-operation with other auto and motor clubs of the state in learning what can be done with the tax. The autoists do not object of paying a tax but do regret that the taxes so paid go to the general fund and not a cent of it to improvement of the roads.

LAKES FROZEN OVER YET

INTREPID FISHERMEN RETURN FROM INTERIOR JUNCT.

Find Fishing Good and Weather Cold at Head of Grande Ronde.

While the Grande Ronde valley has been undergoing warm and balmy weather, and on rare occasion oppressive heat, the Grande Ronde lakes at the headwaters of the Grande Ronde river are covered around the edges with ice, according to the La Grande fishermen who pierced the interior with a caravan last week, and who returned last evening.

The men found that the lakes are frozen around the edges, that it is possible to walk out on the ice and fish in the center of the lakes.

Their journey into the dense interior afforded a great deal of pleasant pastime and some hard work. In the party were W. J. Church, Will Selgrist, Robert Newlin, J. J. Carr and Joe Wood, the first men to drive a four-horse team into that country. Last year the territory was penetrated by a two-horse team but this caravan of four horses was the first of its kind ever entering the district. Fishing was good.

Talk About Scared.

While the trip was a hummer, two of the party feel the shivers of fright even today. While calmly fishing in the icy waters, Joe Carr and Will Church were scared into a week of illness by the sight of what they believed to be a half-starved cougar, coming at them with hair-raising vengeance. The two men were unarmed and went into cold sweat over the proposition and even yet both or either are caught shivering with fright at the thought of what might have occurred. Other members of the party were conveyed to the spot and a search revealed a stray bloodhound. It had been the cause of the alarm. This was the only disagreeable feature of the trip, and it is no joke or scurrilous handling of words to say both the men were honestly scared at what they saw.

Diaz marked the last blow to the imperialists and practically ended the long war of the Napoleonic invasion.
