Last year she did valiant work as a picket in the shirt waist girls' strike in New York and was arrested for it, but she didn't mind that. Miss Milholland could shine in society if she desired, but she is too much of an individualist to become an aping model for gowns and millinery.

HANLY ADDRESS TRAINS DELAYED ATTRACTS MANY HOURS

GREAT DEAL OF IMPORTANCE IS ATTACHED TO IT. SERIOUS CLOUDBURST NEAR DURKEE LAST NIGHT.

Speaker of the Day Will Appear on Public Rostrum July 4th. Mail Train Delayed Twelve Hours by Big Washouts.

The coming of J. Frank Hanly, ex-governor of Indiana, as the principal speaker of the Fourth of July celebration in this city, has come to be a prominent drawing card of the festivities and from far and near sounds the desire to hear the eastern reformer. Governor Hanly will speak from a rostrum on the streets of La Grande, though the exact location of it has not been announced. It will be at some convenient spot.

Mr. Hanly was to have appeared with the lecture bureau of the chautauqua but was given to the Fourth of July celebration committee as an added attraction to that celebration. A great deal of interest is attached to Governor Hanly's address as it will be the first one delivered by him in Oregon on his present tour.

At University of Wisconsin.

Madison, Wis., June 21.—The 58th commencement of the University of Wisconsin concluded today with the graduation exercises. President C. P. Van Hise conferred degrees on the largest graduating class in the history of the institution.

After about 12 hours' delay, traffic was resumed on the O-W today following a washout near Durkee yesterday afternoon. A considerable stretch of main line track was washed away and before the delay could be overcome, the mail train, No. 9 of last night, and No. 5 of early this morning, had been delayed many hours. The mail train due at 9:15 last night arrived about 9 this morning and No. 5 about 10 o'clock. No. 17 was only a few hours late.

The cloudburst was a severe one, sweeping the tracks before it when the canyons had been flooded. No other serious damage was done.

Kaiser Greeted Americans.

Kiel, June 21.—The emperor today exchanged visits with Admiral Badger and the officers of the American battleships which are paying a week's visit to Kiel. Dr. David Jayne Hill, the American ambassador at Berlin, officiated at the introductions. The meeting of the emperor and the Americans was of a most cordial nature.
