MORTGAGE FILED HERE IS HUGE

TOTAL ONE HUNDRED AND SEVENTY-FIVE MILLIONS.

Represents Loan to O. W. R. & N. Company Recently Made.

A mortgage representing a loan of \$175,000,000 negotiated by the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company from the Farmers Loan and Trust company, incorporated in the state of New York, was offered for filing in the county recorder's office late yesterday afternoon. The fees necessary to cover the filing expense, reports County Recorder I. R. Snook, were \$66 as compared with the average cost of \$1.40 or \$1.50. This immense transaction represents the steps taken by the Harriman interests some time ago to take over the North Bank, at the time the company changed its name from O. R. & N. to O. W. R. & N. The mortgage is printed in book form of 97 pages and similar documents are filed in every county wherein the company has property. The mortgage is by far the biggest thing of its kind ever recorded in this county.
