### MOATS' REMAINS AT REST

FUNERAL AT SUMMERVILLE IS MARKED BY BIG ATTENDANCE.

Soldier, Church Worker and Man of High Esteem Everywhere.

George Scott Moats was born in Mt. Erie, Wayne county, Illinois, Dec. 2nd, 1876, and died in Oregon June 14, 1911. During the Spanish-American war, he enlisted June 28, 1898, belonging to the Ninth Illinois regiment company E for a time and was later transferred to the 30th regiment, infantry volunteers United States, company E. On Sept. 1st, 1899, he was made corporal and was promoted to sergeant Feb. 11, 1901. After having served 11 months in Cuba and 22 months in Manila, he was honorably discharged April 3rd, 1901.

Mr. Moats then came to Union county, Oregon, where on Feb. 2, 1902, he married Mrs. Ida Woodell, and to this union two children were born. Only one child, Georgie, besides the widow survives him. Besides these, he leaves a father, mother, five brothers and two sisters. They are: Mr. and Mrs. Albert S. Moats, John L. August, Wm. P. Homer, and Mrs. Mary Forbes all of Mt. Erie, Illinois; Arthur H. of Vancouver, B. C.; Mrs. Lillie C. Allen, of Golden Gate, Illinois; and Albert J. Moats of Ferguson, Mo.

Mr. Moats was a true Christian gentleman. His sympathies were broad, and whenever there was need, he always had time and money to spend for relief. He was usually the first on the ground to help. He not only left the second great commandment, but he showed his great regard for the first by being always present at every service of the church. No storm nor visitor prevented him from fulfilling his duty to his church and his God. Many people are in the kingdom because of his prayers and personal ef-

forts. As a trustee and steward of the church, as a Sunday school superintendent and teacher and as a friend and trusted counselor, he will be mourned a long time by everybody. He leaves a vacancy that will be hard to fill.

Mr. Moats was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church in Summerville, Oregon. His funeral services were held Sunday, June 18th, at 2 o'clock in the above named church. Rev. H. S. Hamilton of Allice, assisted the pastor, H. P. Peterson, in pronouncing the last sad rite. The body of Mr. Moats was laid to rest in the Summerville cemetery. More than 125 teams followed in the procession.
