Union, June 25.—(Special)—Baker played herself into close proximity to Elgin's standing in the percentage column here yesterday in one of the finest games ever seen in Union. MORE MONEY TO DEPOSITORS

AT LEAST PROBABLE THAT DIVIDEND IS COMING.

Proposed Issue Is Ten Per Cent, and Will Be Final as Well.

Probability of another and final 10 per cent dividend from the assets of the Farmers and Traders National bank in this city, prior to its failure three years ago, is contained in a private letter received from George C. Rankin, receiver of the defunct bank. Mr. Rankin's office is at Washington, D. C., and in a personal letter to F. L. Meyers, cashier of the La Grande National, Mr. Rankin points out that it has been his motive to issue a 10 per cent dividend at once but finds trouble in doing so. However, the chances are that the dividend will be forthcoming within a short time, and when it does it will represent the final distribution of assets in that bank.

The first dividend was for 45 per cent and soon after another dividend of 10 per cent was issued making a total of 55 per cent up to date, and if the proposed dividend is issued, it will

make a total slightly in excess of the original anticipations of the comptroller.

MRS. E. J. BAKER PASSES AWAY

AGED PIONEER DIES EARLY THIS MORNING.

Funeral Set for Tomorrow Afternoon at 2 O'Clock.

Mrs. E. J. Baker, widow of the late Attorney M. Baker, a pioneer of Oregon, and mother of Attorney J. F. Baker, of this city, died at 12:15 this morning at the home of S. K. Baker, 806 Spring street. Mrs. Baker was 78 years last December. The funeral arrangements have been set for 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon and will be held from the family home on Spring avenue.

The deceased was a pioneer of the first water and has seen La Grande grow from a hamlet clustered about a few shacks in what is now South La Grande, to a small city, and in that time Mrs. Baker has lived almost exclusively in La Grande.

A large family of sons and a daughter survive the intrepid pioneer. They are: J. F. Baker, La Grande; S. K. Baker, La Grande; Jessie Matott, La Grande; David of Tacoma; Horace of Emmett, Lloyd of Weiser, and James, of Turlock, Cal.

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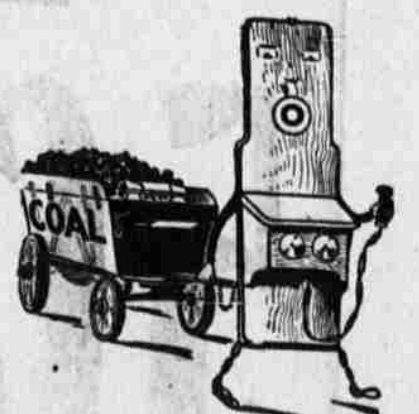
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
