EXTENDS LEASE ON HOSPITAL

MISS MARGARET KELLY TO HAVE
CHARGE ANOTHER YEAR.

Institution Shows Gain and Improve-
ment Under Her Lease.

Leases were today signed wherein
Miss Margaret Kelly will continue as
lessee of the Grande Ronde hospital
under the rules and regulations gov-
erning the institution. Miss Kelly
has made a good record under her old
lease and it is understood there was
not a dissenting vote of the directo-
rate when the question of renewing the
lease was brought up.

Of late the hospital has been doing
almost its capacity work. People from
Wallowa county, as well as the valley,
are taking advantage of the treatment
offered and many operations have
been recorded on the books during the
past twelve months. First class
equipment enables the most delicate
surgical operations to be performed
here and remarkable success with pa-
tients has been the history of the in-
stitution. The surgery room is recog-
nized as the best that can be installed,
and the wards and private rooms are
not only well equipped but they are
well cared for.

Under Miss Kelly nine nurses are
regularly employed and both day and
night service is as good as could be
obtained in larger cities.

MALHEUR WILL GET HEARING

WATER SUPERINTENDENT TO VIS-
IT WILLOW CREEK REGION.

Waters in that Stream to be Adju-
dicated on July 17.

Water Superintendent George T.
Cochran has set July 17 as the time
for hearing and inspecting claims to
water rights in Willow creek, Malheur
county. There will be much interest
attached to this adjudication as there
are many claimants for water and it
will also be the first time the new
water commissioners have taken up
a Malheur stream. Mr. Cochran will
go to Willow creek on that date and
all claimants will be allowed to come
in and learn what each claimant de-
mands. The adjudication depends on
prior rights and Mr. Cochran distrib-
utes the water in accordance with the
testimony and demands of each user.
There are about 110 claimants.

Stringing Gold Beads.

"We used to string gold beads on a
slender gold chain," said the jeweler,
"but now we don't unless ordered. The
gold used in the chain is harder than
that of which the beads are made, and
so the chain wears the beads in their
perforations and channels out little
worn places at the ends of the perfora-
tions in the circumference of the beads
and so makes them less perfect. And
however slender the chain may be,
beads strung on a chain do not fall
and lie in curves always smooth and
graceful. So now usually we string
gold beads on a silk cord, a material of
perfect smoothness, flexibility and
adaptability; on a silk cord the string
of beads falls gracefully. To be sure,
the silk wears out sooner than a gold
chain would do, and if strung on silk
the beads should be restrung once or
twice a year, according to how much
they are worn, but for stringing gold
beads a silk cord seems to answer the
purpose most perfectly."—New York
Sun.
