NEW LAWS RULE THE PARK

MANY IMPORTANT REGULATIONS MUST BE ENFORCED.

None of the Natural Beauties Are to Be Marred by Carelessness.

Rules and regulations governing Riverside park, intended to make the place a model of amusement and recreation and still not mar the natural beauties of the place have been adopted by the park commission and summarized, as follows:

No flower or shrub shall be picked in Riverside park.

Shooting positively forbidden in the park.

All garbage and refuse must be put into receptacles placed in the park for that purpose.

Writing or carving on trees, bridges strictly forbidden. Horses must be kept on the roadway and not tied to trees.

No one is allowed to open or close the water gates or interfere with the splash boards in any way without authority from the park authorities or Henry Young who has been appointed by the park commission to look after these things.

The park keeper has been appointed deputy sheriff with full power to arrest any party who does not conform to the rules made for the best interests of the property.

BUNGALOW FOR BATH HOUSE

JULY EIGHTH SET FOR TAG DAY TO RAISE MONEY.

Believed Structure Can Be Commenced at Once—Plans Complete.

July 8, aviation day, has been definitely set as tag day when 45 young ladies of La Grande under direction of Miss Zoe Bragg, Waldo Geddes and George H. Currey, Jr., will dispose of the 10 cent tags for accumulation of sufficient funds to complete the bathing house and facilities at Riverside park. It is believed that with the \$100 already on hand the building can be commenced so that it will be ready for use immediately after tag day. It is supposed that the tags will accumulate sufficient money to complete the funds needed, in all about \$350.

Plans Are Ready.

It will be a modern bungalow-bathing house. The plans call for a bungalow structure, faced with a promenade or pier, from which spring boards, ladders and water chutes radiate, and in addition a floating pier where beginners can reach shallow water. On the inside of the building the space will be divided into three departments—a big room for boys and the "kids" and on one side a string

of lockers and dressing rooms for men, and on the other similar facilities for ladies.

Lavatories and all conveniences of a modern bath house will be provided. The architecture is such as to make it neat in appearance and the general plan insures convenience and splendid facilities in every respect. Everything will be free to everyone.
