His 83 estates comprise approximately 250,000 acres. The revenues from these estates flow into the Kaiser's pockets in addition to his allowance of nearly \$5,000,000 from the government.

Referendum is Attacked. Washington, July 11.—Ridicule of the initiative and referendum and recall was the burden of a speech in the senate today by Sutherland of Utah. He said the tendency of the so-called popular government is to emasculate and ultimately destroy representative government. Legislatures will be swallowed up by the initiative and referendum and courts will be obliterated by the recall and political parties will be juggled out of existence by the direct primary.

Santa Rost Wreck Studied. San Francisco, Cal., July 11.—Captain Gunnison and First Mate Krouse of the steam schooner Helen H. Drew, appeared before the federal inspectors Bulger and Bolles today in the inquiry into the wreck of the steamer Santa Rosa. Captain Gunnison said he kept his ship within easy reach of the doomed vessel so assistance could be given at any time. Krouse corroborated the captain's testimony. The investigation will be continued tomorrow.

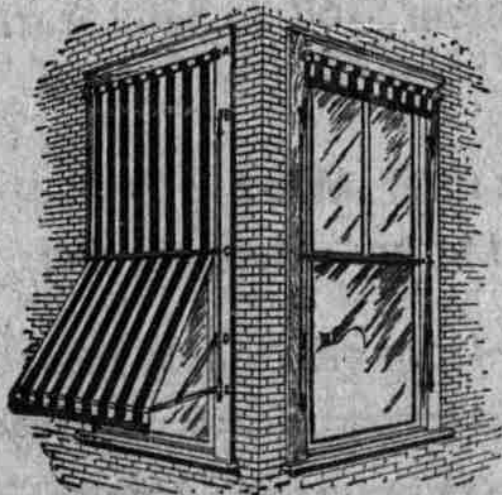
