SIXTY-FIVE ARE DELINQUENT

HIGGEST LIST OF THE YEAR FOR-GOT RENTS.

Only Four of That Number, However, Have Not Paid up Now.

Sixty-five Beaver creek water users were disconnected immediately after the 10th of this month for not paying their water rents, and today all but four of that number are again back in the good graces of the water department. This is the largest list of delinquents in any one month since the pay every 10th clause became operative and was enforced. This law has been the means of placing the water department on a business basis and instead of being allowed to bring in what it would, it now turns in rent monthly for every meter used. A great majority of those who neglected to pay are the substantial business men of the city, who simply forgot.

Admiral Comly Retires

Washington, D. C., July 13.—After 45 years of honorable service, filled with adventure and interesting experiences in many parts of the world, Rear Admiral Samuel P. Comly was placed on the retired list of the navy today on account of age. Admiral Comly is a native of New Jersey and entered the naval academy at Annapolis from that state in 1865. Early in his career he accompanied the famous Junlata expedition to the Arctic. During the war with Spain he was an officer on the battleship Indiana, and participated in the naval engagement at Santiago. His last duty was as commandant of the navy yard at Philadelphia.

Notice is hereby given that in pursuance of a resolution adopted by the common council of the city of La Grande, Oregon, on the 17th day of August, 1910, creating improvement district No. 25, and designating Chestnut street, as such district, and in pursuance of a resolution adopted by said common council on the 7th day of June, 1911, whereby said council determined and declared its intention to improve all that portion of Chestnut street, in said improvement district as

hereinafter described, by constructing cement walks 12 feet wide on both sides of the street, the council will, ten day after the service of this notice upon the owners of the property affected and benefited by such improvement, order that said above described improvement be made; that the boundaries of said district to be so improved are as follows:

All that portion of Chestnut street, from the north line of alley between Adams and Jefferson avenue, to the south line of Jefferson avenue.

(A) And the property affected or benefitted by said improvement is as follows: Lot 13, block 115, Chaplin's addition and Lot 1, block 114, Chaplin's addition, all in La Grande, Oregon.

Notice is hereby further given that the council will levy a special assessment on all the property affected or benefitted by such improvement for the purpose of paying for such improvement. That the estimated cost of

such improvement is the sum of \$412.33. That the council will, on the 19th day of July, 1911, meet at the council chamber at the hour of 8 o'clock, p. m., to consider said estimated cost, and the levy of said assessment when a hearing will be granted to any person feeling aggrieved by such assessment.
