**PRAYER DENIED
MRS. M. WEST**

**JUDGE KNOWLES HANDS DOWN
DECISION TODAY.**

**Appeal for a New Trial to Recover
Policy Is Denied.**

Maggie A. West can not be given a new trial in her suit against the Mutual Life Insurance company to recover money on a policy held by her husband prior to his suicide at Baker some years ago. Her appeal for a new trial presented to Judge Knowles soon after a circuit court jury here gave her a small sum, approximately \$300, was denied today by Judge Knowles.

West, who was at one time connected with the Observer, went to Baker, and becoming despondent, committed suicide by the morphine route in the Crabill hotel. The Mutual Life Insurance company suspended payment on the life insurance policy and the recent litigation in this court followed. The trial was held this spring.

FAMILY BURNED IN HOUSE.

**Gasoline Used to Kill Bugs Ignited
and Family Cremated.**

Grand Junction, Col., July 13.—J. O. Williams, wife and three children were burned to death at Ruby Lake yesterday. Mr. Williams poured gasoline in the cracks of the floor to kill bugs. The fluid became ignited and the house burned, while the occupants were unable to escape.

**GRAND JURY REPORTS NOT EX-
PECTED UNTIL FRIDAY.**

Murder at Walla Walla.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 13.—Following a fist fight engaged in last night William Melnecke early today shot and fatally wounded Dallas Marquis, a hack driver and then blew out his own brains. Melnecke was arrested by Patrolman Wilcox but refused to surrender his gun. As the officer and prisoner entered the police station Melnecke slipped the revolver from his pocket, and killed himself.

Long Race for Motor Boats.

New York, July 13.—All arrangements have been concluded for the power boat race which is to be started tomorrow afternoon from Huntington, Long Island, with Marblehead, Mass., as the objective point. The race will cover a distance of 240 nautical miles. The contest will be confined to boats of not less than 30 feet over all, and not exceeding in the greatest length, 40 feet on deck. Only boats built and used for cruising are eligible.
