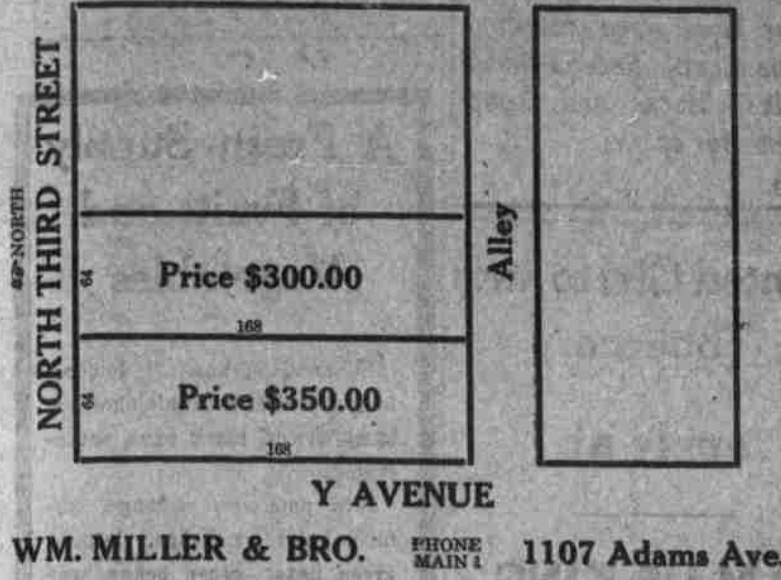

JOINT GROUNDS ARE PROMOTED

AUTO AND HORSE RACE FAIR GROUNDS PLAN.

Athletic Park and Three Organizations May Combine.

Amalgamation of horse race fans, baseball "bugs", county fair adherents—which includes everybody almost—and the Union Motor Club into one big, strong, and effective association to lease, equip and maintain a race track athletic park and fair grounds near La Grande is the newest thing in the sporting circles of the city.

The movement has taken a big hold, brought to a focus by a highly successful auto meet at Baker last Monday. Without a track it is impossible to hold auto meets, horse race meets or any kind of race and lovers of the sport are hankering for suitable grounds. They have advanced the opinion that the county fair can be profitably interested in the movement, though no decision has been reached by that association yet. Promoters of the conglomerate association see in it a chance to further the interest of the fair by having permanent fair quarters instead of holding it in town each year where the buildings must be torn down; the auto and horse races could be held at any time and would not need to be a part of the fair each year unless it was so decided. The main object is to get suitable facilities for holding the fair, the auto meets and the horse race meets singly and at any time it is desired.

Some have been skirmishing about looking for probable sites for such a project and claim to have several near town. Many elements that would profit by the movement are being interested in the scheme and within a few days it is believed something tangible will be started that the races can be realized next year at the latest.

LA GRANDE WINS 1911 PENNANT

LAST GAMES NOT PLAYED AND LA GRANDE WINS

Double Headed Games Cut Off Because of Approaching Heat.

Winning nine games out of 12 in the schedule La Grande has this week dragged down the 1911 pennant of the Eastern Oregon league. While there was little likelihood of being defeated under the original schedule, the pennant was finally cinched when the list of games to be played was changed from 16 to 12. The original schedule there were to be 16 games with the last four as double headers that the league season might end in the middle of July. The approach of hot weather, lack of attendance in one or the towns, and a losing arrangement of pay to players in others, made the change of games necessary as the double headed games had not been played.

In a great many ways the season was a remarkably successful one. Aside from the fact that La Grande won the pennant there are many other commendable features to the league among which is the primary matter of the kind of ball presented. Attendance has been good in La Grande, Baker and Elgin and good in Union too, size of town considered. The Grande team from home ranks was a reflection of the popularity of the team and its playing during the playing season. Good clean ball meant good crowds and except for the last game of the season, every team got along with a great per cent less "rag chewing" than in any previous year. La Grande's players, some of them rather, messed things up a little in the last game, but it was the only instance of it during the year and because of the fact that good crowds followed La Grande's victory over Baker on May 23, large crowds marked all the games, and good ball continued.

But looking back over the 1911 season there is no other verdict to be reached than a season of extremely snappy, clean and interesting ball in each corner of the quadrangle forming the league. The fans got their money's worth, and except for the burst of speed shown by the La Grande team at the outset when she ran away from the other teams for six games, the four clubs were evenly matched throughout. One might go on for columns and columns dwelling on the various phases of the league, but the extra inning games, the sensational fielding records of many of the players, their hitting records and the generally high plane of excellency throughout the four clubs, is commendable from every standpoint.

Season to Continue

Baker and La Grande will play a series of four games commencing tomorrow and alternating between the Union and Elgin will likely play some games and when La Grande will present a team of home players entirely, Union will hook up with us. So there will be baseball for weeks to come, though not under organized schedules.

It has been a league of high-class pitching. Each town had good twirlers and several of them as a rule.

The plan of paying umpires for their work and insisting on their enforcing order worked 90 per cent tip top. The improvement was vastly great over former years. With modifications, the same rule should be adopted next season.

FAST MEET IS POSSIBLE HERE

TRACK FOUND TO BE IN CONDITION FOR MEET.

Matter Will Be Put Up to Motor Club Directors at First Chance.

Possibilities of holding an auto race meet with entrants from all over Eastern Oregon and perhaps a few exhibition races by speedy wheel manipulators, have become really brilliant in this city following close inspection of the old race track grounds near Ieland City. Those who have been on the old track, long since discarded, say the chances for holding a race meet on it are excellent and that about \$100 will put the track in the finest of shape. Working on this supposition, the men in favor of the races have approached the directors of the Motor club and action will be taken by that body shortly.

"I inspected the track today, and found it in fine condition to make useable with the expenditure of about \$75 or \$100," said Fred Dittbrandt, of the Dittbrandt Auto company last night. "We do not want to let Baker show us anything about the auto meet business; they had a good one and we will too."

The date discussed now is the last of the present month.

Tomorrow and tonight as well there will be a chug chug of gasoline destroyers in this county and the smoke will all be towards the fish hatchery where the Union County Motor club will assemble tomorrow at noon for a fine picnic. Each party is to carry its own luncheon and enjoy the day fishing and resting in the cool of the canyon.

All in all the Hudson was up against a combination of hard luck and poor enforcement of the laws for the Buick should have been disqualified, though it was not. The meet was exceptionally well attended and of great interest to every one.
