Tuberculosis and Its Warfare

During the fall and winter of 1910 a field worker of the Pennsylvania Society for the Prevention of Tuberculosis made a study of the local needs and conditions in the anti-tuberculosis campaign in Allentown, Easton, and Williamsport.

In Allentown the Board of Health is laxly administered; in Williamsport there is a slightly better administration, and in Easton there is a fairly efficient Board of Health.

In all of the towns registration of tuberculosis began in 1906 under the state law. Physicians in all three cities, with very few exceptions are uneducated in the importance of registration. A large proportion of the cases reported come through the local state dispensary, and the total number of cases reported is only a small percentage of the probable number of living cases.

There is a State Health Department dispensary in each of the towns investigated. In Allentown 450 cases have been examined at the State Dispensary since its opening, an average attendance of 18 a day. In Easton 315 cases were examined; 11 cases were under care at the time of the investigation; and the nurses averaged 30 home visits a month. In Williamsport 769 cases were examined; and 221 cases were under care at the time of the investigation. The two nurses made 328 home visits the month the investigation was made. In the estimation of the investigator, the dispensaries in all three towns were inefficient on the social side of their work.

None of these cities have any local provision for hospital or sanatorium care of consumptives. These cases must be sent to the State Sanatorium at Mont Alto, which is a great distance from the three towns. Dispensary workers all report difficulty in getting patients to go to the State Sanatorium. A few indigent consumptives find their way to county poor houses, none of which is equipped for the proper care of consumptives. In each
