SUGAR PROBE CONTINUES.

Official Testifies Unwillingly of Gobbled-up Trade.

Washington, July 18.—B. Thomas, chairman of the board of directors of the American Sugar Refining company, was the chief witness today before the Hardwick committee investigating the trust.

Thomas unwillingly admitted the trust had gobbled a large share of preferred stock of the National Sugar Refining company and is backing the company in New Jersey with the understanding that the company should be a part of whom is the son of Henry O. Havemeyer. Thomas admitted the National company was in a position to become a potent factor in the trade if the trust did not control it and that the real competition might result from the being foot loose.
